on possible theories about the arrival of Christian Weedman, Sr. in 1750. Kathryn Weedman-Cox operates the Cox B&W Lab in Rancho Cordova, CA. They specialize in restoration and reproduction of historical photographs and have among their client list The California State Library, The Sacramento Archives, The National Archives, The BBC, and many others. We hope she can attend a future Reunion and demonstrate services provided and give a talk on what we individually can do to preserve our old pictures.

A Trip to the National Archives

One advantage of having family in the Northern Virginia and Washington D.C. area is the opportunity to do family research at the National Archives. In February, we renewed a special research card that provides access to original files for many records. In a limited time, we were able to review the Civil War pension files for **Catherine Keefover**, whose son, Jacob Keefover, died in VA and for as well as that for **Delilah Hand Weedman**.

The Civil War pension files are a goldmine for genealogical information in many cases. But, they also must be taken in context. When applying for a pension, it was in the applicant's best interest to show that they were destitute and if rejected, the poorhouse might be the next stop. In reality, the applicant's were rarely in such dire straits.

Delilah Hand married Asa Weedman, a son of John Huhn Weedman, Sr. on 20 October 1836 in IL. Asa died in 1866 or 1868 and left a large family. Two sons, John William Weedman and Norman A. Weedman, served in the Civil War. John William Weedman died in the Andersonville prison in Georgia where so many died of malnutrition. His death was on 15 November 1864. In her application for a pension, a statement relative to Norman Weedman indicated that while he survived the war, he never married and as "never right" after he returned from the service.

The pension file was quite thick and contained one of the earliest pre-nuptial agreements we have seen (there was one earlier one for Barbara Weedman Riffle prior to her marriage to Michael **Kern(s)**). In addition, there were numerous letters from neighbors and "friends" some of whom stated that her husband, Edmund Adams, could not support her and she deserved the pension of \$12.00 per month. Others, and there were many, stated that she was actually quite well off. Some stated that when Asa Weedman died that she and each of the children received an inheritance of \$1,300 or so. In addition, some stated that Mr. Adams was well off in his own right. Included in the folder were letters to the President of the U.S. and to the Secretary of War objecting to her pension! Due to the thickness of the file, I failed to make copies of many of the more interesting and pertinent papers so need to return to accomplish that. It appeared to me that she was successful in obtaining the pension, but due to objections it was later withdrawn.

Another aspect of interest was the fact that **Delilah Adams**, was residing in Louisburg, Kansas much of the time while applying and defending her pension. But also, that she intended to return to Webster City, Iowa. The pension application process began in 1890 and continued for a number of years. The fact that she could apparently move easily between Louisburg and Webster City in

those days, when transportation was more limited, was interesting.

Delilah Adams did return to Hamilton Co., IA and died in Woolstock, IA on 13 September 1909. She is buried in Webster City, IA.

Another file that contained extremely interesting information was an application for a mother's pension by **Catherine Keefover** who also had two sons in the Civil War. She was the wife of **James Keefover** whose mother was **Catherine (Weedman) (Huhn) Keefover** about whom a article will begin in the next issue.

One son, **Jacob Keefover**, died of "brain fever" while serving with his unit near Richmond, VA. He was never injured in battle and may never have actually fought in the War. In the folder at the National Archives is a letter from the Commanding Officer of **Jacob Keefover** advising his parents of his death. A copy of the letter will appear in the Newsletter as part of the article on Catherine Keefover.

There was no argument against the pension for **Catherine Keefover** who stated she would be dependent on the income to sustain her and her husband. She received a pension until her death.

There will be another trip to the National Archives in early summer and we intend to obtain copies of pertinent papers in other Weedman family member files.

(This is a continuation of an article on recording an oral history by Kenneth R. Weedman. The techniques and types of questions are educational. The entire interview on the web site (www.weedman.org) in April, 2007. This will conclude the story.)

INTERVIEW WITH CHARLES KENNETH WEEDMAN & ELNA ALICE LUMPKIN WEEDMAN 1982

This interview is from an hour-long tape with a transcription of 72 pages that I have edited. I have taken excerpts from general interest stories of how these families lived. People are spoken of by first name, nick name or Mom and Dad and I have placed their full name and dates after their spoken name the first time they appear in the text.

Tape of Charles Kenneth Weedman (CKW) (Dec. 6, 1912 – Aug. 27, 1990) and Elna Alice Lumpkin Weedman (ELW) (Feb. 27, 1913 – June 12, 2001): Interviewed by Kenneth Russell Weedman (KRW) in 1982 at their home in Little Rock, Arkansas.

KRW: Now, tell me what you did on Sunday afternoon when you were a boy (Charles Kenneth Weedman 1912-90).

CKW: My daddy (Norman Benedict Weedman 1876-1943) would hook up that little red horse to the hack and we'd go for a ride. What's a hack - some people call it a buggy. It has one seat up front, but two people could sit on it. Mom (Sarah Hilma Malmstrom Weedman 1881-1953) & Dad would sit up front, and she'd hold the baby and he'd drive the horse. Well, according to when it was. I was the baby sometimes, and Elizabeth (Elizabeth Weedman 1915-1987) was the baby Some times, and then Dorothy (Dorothy Weedman 1918-2005) was the baby sometimes. But Bill (William Russell Weedman 1925-1957) never was the baby in that hack.

KRW: What did you do, Mama (Elna Alice Lumpkin Weedman 1913-2001)? Did you go riding with on Sunday afternoon?

ELW: We had a Surrey with a Fringe on top. Lucy (Janie Lucille Lumpkin 1915-2003) and I rode in the back. Mama (Lou Craig Lumpkin 1892-47) held Claude (Claude Cleo Lumpkin, Jr. 1917-95) in her lap. I saw my first prairie chicken

CKW: Well, what did you do with Anne (Anne Craig Lumpkin 1919)?

ELW: She wasn't born daddy. I saw my first prairie chickens run across the road.

ELW: And Daddy (Claude Cleo Lumpkin 1891-70) and Mama pointed them out, and Daddy remarked at the time "I rarely see a prairie chicken" and he called our attention to it.

KRW: What year was that, do you remember?

ELW: I wasn't very old. I couldn't have been, but I remember it vividly because Daddy said... Daddy stopped the horse, and when they scurried across the road he said "look at the prairie chickens." They looked scrawny to me.

KRW: Well did you all have a seat in that surrey with the fringe on top.

ELW: No, just the one seat on the front. And like daddy said on theirs, Mama put a quilt (in the back bed).

CKW: Kind of like a pickup truck bed back there.

ELW: And Lucy and I sat on (the quilt). He was out to survey his farmland, and to see how the colored people were working on the farms. And that's why we took the ride in the buggy. We had a car, but you went in the Surrey because you could stop and go and look and wouldn't get stuck. We didn't have roads that a car would or could take you over.

CKW: It was just all dirt roads then. We didn't have much gravel roads then.

KRW: That was out there around the houses that had the breezeways right daddy? Living quarters were on one side and the kitchen and all were on the other.

ELW: That's right.

KRW: Why would those houses have those breezeways?

CKW: Makes them cooler. They didn't have air conditioning then.

TAPE STOPS, THEN STARTS AGAIN.

KRW: You worked in the sawmill and what was your job?

CKW: I did everything that you could do in a sawmill. I set blocks, worked on the carriage, fired the boiler and I off burden, run the cut-off saw, and toted slabs and run the edger.

ELW: Cut a skunk in two one time.

CKW: Yeah. They'd brought a log in one time that had a hollow in it and Dad put it on the carriage and I set it out there. He said to set it out there a ways, so I did, and he run it through there. That skunk was in that hollow in that log. It just sawed that skunk in two. Man, you talk about stink.

KRW: What did your dad say?

CKW: That it smelled so bad he could nearly taste it.

ELW: They were so sick. They all had to go home.

KRW: You had to shut down that day?

CKW: Well after we ate lunch we did.

KRW: After you ate lunch ... aw, shoot.

ELW: He told me they vomited. It was horrible.

CKW: No, we didn't vomit. There were some of them felt like they wanted to vomit.

KRW: Who all was working there that day? Granddad and who else with you, Bernard (Norman Bernard Weedman 1911-55)?

CKW: No, he wasn't there (Bernard). There were eight or ten of us working there. I don't remember all the names, or who they all were. He gave us the jobs that you had to pay the highest salaries. One of us worked on the carriage; the other would fire the boiler. It paid two bits an hour for those jobs. And others, they just paid twenty cents. It was about...1930-31. During the Great Recession or Depression. Whatever you want to call it.

KRW: Well, you went to work on the riverboats after that didn't you?

CKW: I worked on a Snag boat C.B. Reese, and the Steamboat Arkansas.

ELW: What was the barge?

CKW: I worked on a barge on the Black River, except it wasn't self-propelled.

The Harve Goodman wasn't it?

KRW: Well, if it wasn't self-propelled, what did you do?

CKW: Well, you floated. Float down the river on it.

KRW: What was your job on the barge? Pulling crosscut saw and what else?

CKW: No, I was a clerk on the barge.

He enlisted in the armed forces and served for two years in the army.


On June 12, 1955, he married **Marilyn Svensson** in Comfrey, MN where their three children, Brenda, Steven and Brian were born.

Christian Weedman, Sr. Immigration Possibilities

We corresponded a few months back regarding Minnie D. Weedman the mother of my step-father is Fred D. Weedman. We trace his roots back to Christian Weedman, Sr. through the following line: Christian Weedman, Sr.¹; George Weedman²; John Huhn Weedman, Sr.3; Thomas S. Weedman⁴; Fred John Weedman⁵; Dale Fred Weedman⁶. Because of this (and because history in general just fascinates me), I have some interest in Christian Weedman. Sr. and his origins and would like to propose a few theories regarding his arrival since you appear to be the resident expert on the subject.

I have been intrigued by a comment that I've found in one of the Weedman Newsletters and have been doing a bit of research. I had already noted that Christian had come to America in 1750 on the "Anderson" and that he was the only "Widman" on the ship. I had found the Anderson documentation in some of my own research. What I didn't know was that he was 15 years old (as referenced in the Weedman Newsletter, Spring '05, pg 3). I haven't been able to find any source that actually gave me his age. Assuming that this reference was more or less correct, I was fascinated by how a 15-year old boy would come to the states alone even in the mid-1700's that sounded odd to me.

From my reading of the *Weedman Newsletter*, it appears you are currently working on a theory that he came over with friends or family members that didn't share the "Widman" name. I assume you're doing this by researching each of

the individuals on the list to see if any of them have a Weedman history or future travels similar to where we know Christian went. I agree that this is the most likely situation and that he is likely from Germany or Holland. But I have a couple other ideas for why Christian may have been alone - you may have considered these already but since I haven't come upon any such reference in the newsletter, I'm just not sure and want to see what you think. Again – I think the first theory is the least far fetched, though the third is also intriguing. The second is not very likely given a recent finding in the Weedman newsletter, but I listed it anyhow.

- 1. Christian's parents/other family members could have perished on the voyage. From my research, the voyage could take anywhere from 8-12 weeks to get from England to Philadelphia. Conditions on board the ships were sometimes known to be less than perfect. I read accounts on hot meals as little as 3 times a week, heavily salted meats, bad water, etc. causing a high mortality rate in passengers. If both of Christian's parents (or family members) perished while on board, they would not have been listed as taking the oath when arriving at Philadelphia. Also - Christian, if indeed 15 years old, would have been at a very strong age to survive the journey. This would explain why he had no family/ friends on board ship with him or here in America (that we've found so far). I have been trying to find some record of the Anderson when it arrived in England or some record from when it left Rotterdam to prove or disprove this theory, but to no avail.
- 2. Could Christian have been sold into indentured servitude when he arrived? Every article I've been able to find about indentured servitude in Pennsylvania describes the voyage as starting

in Rotterdam, through Cowles (or Cowes in some sources) England, to Philadelphia. I realize this is likely a very common route for a variety of Europeans coming to the new world in the 1750s (and in fact I found the same route referenced by those fleeing Holland around this time), but I can't explain why none of us have been able to find any reference to him until much later (1762?). If he was indeed 15, indentured servitude would explain why we couldn't find anything for at least 6 years since it was common for those underage to serve until they were 21. Also, if his family did, indeed, perish on the trip, he may have found it difficult to pay for his own voyage. I have found some sources stating that payment was made after the voyage and those who could not make payment had to sell themselves (or their family members) into indentured servitude to pay for their voyage (other sources indicated that some sailed, knowing their voyage was to be paid by parties for their services as indentured servants). I realize this one is shaky - I have no proof - just expressing a possible theory, though I'm not sure how I would even research this one short of finding reference to Christian somewhere in the first couple years after he arrived or an article that indicates what he did once he arrived. I saw in a later Weedman Newsletter that a reference to Christian Weedman in a 1750 Philadelphia tax list was found. If this is the case and this is the same "Christian Widman". I believe the theory would be disproved as I don't think servants paid taxes.

3. I note that every name on the"Anderson list" is a male name. There were women (and children) on board as indicated in the total number of passengers, but women were just apparently not listed. So it is possible that Christian could have traveled to America with a

Mother or with a sister (or to combine with a previous theory, he traveled with both parents, but the father passed away on the journey). As the only male Widman to have arrived, it is possible (not sure how likely - probably not very) that he alone would show up in a tax register in 1750 while mother may not. Certainly if a sister were with him, she would likely not show up on the tax register. Though with this theory I cannot explain why we see no reference to a mother or sister later in life unless they had passed away or simply stayed in Philadelphia. This one is also difficult to prove and almost impossible to disprove (short of a document found that says he came alone). I suppose reference to a woman 20-30 years older than Christian with a Widman last name in the Philadelphia area would be good, but not definite - and what if she remarried or moved? Sometimes I really hate genealogy.

Thank you very much for your time and any thought you can put into these theories. I'm really just looking for feedback on any research you are aware of that would disprove these or if you feel they merit further research. If I'm on a road that you've already traveled to a dead end, I'd like to get off the road long before I reach the same end.

The letter shown in this issue is the only known signature for John Weedman, Sr. We will be watching for more family artifacts on e-Bay.

Marriage records are there as well as census extracts for many years although this is not complete.

As a result of the quality of information available on that site, I was able to fill numerous gaps that existed in our Weedman family data base. We have been able to gain new insights into two families that moved from Perry County, IN to Dyer County, TN. The family records of **John** and **Mariah (Cart) Weedman** who moved in about 1888 and some portions of that of **Green Berry Weedman** have been significantly enhanced due to this web site.

We commend Dyer County RootsWeb coordinators for the extensive and high quality information they are providing.

We have newly updated information on the two Weedman families mentioned and will happily provide that to any interested family member upon request.

A Note from Cathy Stone

You may have gone over this before, but I have been wondering: Could **Christian Sr.** come over to this country with a sister and brother in law? Did the ship's captain keep a log of their journey? Was Christian Jr. married twice? I find it very odd that he had his first child at the age of 27.

I have found no evidence to proof that any Weedman had any relationship with the Green family in Grayson Co. Ky. This doesn't mean they had no relationship. They may have worked on the farm at one time or other. In the Green Family book there was a reference to a Stone, but I don't know which one. I have always wondered how my grandfather was called **Lafayette**. Once I did ask my Dad, but he didn't know. I do not find any Weedman, Dennison or other Stone's to use the name Lafayette. There are a lot of Willis' in both the Stone and Weedman families. As you know **Lafayette Stone** was a son of **John M. & Mehetible Weedman Stone**. I just find that odd.

Response: We have always been of the belief that Christian Weedman, Sr. traveled to this country probably with a relative or at least with close family friend. At his age, the likelihood of immigrating alone seems remote. We don't know of any documentation other than what has been published. The use of the names Willis, Green and Willis Green is prevalent in a number of lines of the Christian Weedman, Jr. families. We published some thoughts on this on page 13, Volume 33 of the Summer 2000 Weedman Newsletter.

John Huhn Weedman, Jr. And his Descendants

(This is the first part of an article that will continued in the Winter 2007 issue of the **Weedman Newsletter**. The intent is to trace the descendents of John Huhn Weedman, Jr.)

John Huhn Weedman, Jr. was arguably the most successful person in the family even to this date. He was a farmer, cattleman, banker and businessman. (We only recently learned from the baptismal records of the Jacobs Lutheran Church near Masontown, PA that **John Weedman, Sr.** was christened **John Huhn Weedman** and not **John Jesse Weedman** as a translation of the records had appeared).

Having had such success, the question has been asked, was there a financially successful dynasty created as a result of his success? While we can't definitively answer that, it is surprising what happened to the descendants of this person.

John Huhn Weedman, Jr. was born on 3 February 1828 in Perry County, Ohio to **John Huhn, Sr.** and **Rachael** (Wilson) Weedman. Rachael was a daughter of **Asa Wilson**.

In August 1830, the family left Perry County, Ohio and headed west settling in Heyworth, McLean County, Illinois which is between Bloomington and Farmer City, IL. **George** and **Charlotte** (**Huhn**) **Weedman** were the elders and with them were several of their sons and daughters with their families. **George Weedman** was the original settler on his land and the fact that rich land was available at low cost or even free in some instances surely attracted the family to Illinois.

We will attempt to show what happened to **John Weedman**, **Jr.** and his descendants in this presentation.

John Weedman, Jr. married **Mary Ann McDonald** (born 22 September 1834) on 31 March 1853. It was about this time or even before that John started to collect land and built what became a successful business empire.

Almost immediately, the couple started a family with the first child, a daughter, being born 1 December 1853. She was apparently still born because the tombstone in Campground Cemetery just south west of Farmer City simply says "infant daughter". A son, **Lyman A. Weedman**, was born on 27 December 1854 but died in 1855. Then, the third child, **Lenora Weedman**, was born 11 September 1856 and she died in 1857.

While the loss of children was not uncommon in the difficult environment on the frontier the loss of three children in four years must have been devastating.

Then, there were four children born to the couple, all survived until adulthood. Children were:

Harriet Josephine Weedman, born 21 December 1857 Cassius Marcellus Clay Weedman, born 12 August 1860 Rachael Rosella Weedman, born 4 March 1862 John Sherman Weedman, born 15 December 1867

While there may have been other children it is likely that is the entire family since they had the resources to put markers on the graves of any children.

The 1860 census of McLean County shows the family of **John Weedman** living in West Township with him being 31 years old and a farmer. His wealth at that time was not particularly remarkable have real estate valued at \$4,000 and a personal estate of some \$2,300.

By 1870, his wealth had accumulated somewhat with real estate valued at \$50,000 and a personal estate of \$25,000. It is doubtful if the values had any definitive measurement but clearly the family was on its way toward a very comfortable existence. It was about this time that the town of Weedman, Illinois was formed and the **John Weedman** farm was just to the west of the town.

John H. Weedman, Sr. moved to Hamilton Co., IA where he died on 12 March 1968. **John H. Weedman, Jr.** died on 30 Jul 1885 at his home in McLean Co., IL and a newspaper article on his death and funeral appears on the Weedman Family web site at www.weedman.org.

Here is a summary of the four surviving children:

John Sherman Weedman

Little is known about **John Sherman Weedman**. He was born on 15 Dec 1867, apparently never married and from a newspaper article we have learned that he died 17 Feb 1908 in an insane asylum in Indianapolis. The article simply says that **C.M.C. Weedman** had been informed of the death and was traveling to bring the body back to Illinois for burial. He is buried in Campground Cemetery in Farmer City.

Cassius Marcellus (Cash) Weedman

Cassius Marcellus Clay Weedman was known as "Cash" Weedman no doubt due to not only his name but the fact that he was at one time a teller in the John Weedman National Bank of Farmer City! He was born He married Grace Gardiner of Farmer City on 15 February 1893 in Farmer City. Grace was born in 1870. Cash Weedman was also a Post Master in Farmer City and seemed to have been a highly respected citizen. There were no children born to this marriage and, from another newspaper article, we have learned that he died on 30 January 1910 in an insane asylum in Kankakee, IL where he had been confined for two years. He is buried in Campground Cemetery.

So, the two surviving male offspring of John and Mary A. Weedman had no children and both died while confined to an institution.

Rachelle Rosella Weedman Young

The youngest daughter was **Rachael Rosella Weedman**, born on 4 March 1862 in McLean County. She married **Thomas V. Young**, son of **Denton** and **Emma Young** of LeRoy in McLean County. The Youngs had a clothing store in LeRoy on in the 1900 census; it is shown that both **Thomas** and **Rachael R.** (**Weedman**) **Young** were working on clothing store presumably that of Denton Young in Empire Township. In the 1900 census, it reveals the couple had been married 8 years and that there were no children at that time. It is known from family tradition that **Thomas** and **Rachael Young** moved to Dallas. In the 1930 census, we find **Thomas V. Young** aged 62 as a boarder in a hotel and that he was a widow. We have been unable to find a listing in 1910 or 1920 for the couple. It has been concluded that the couple remained without issue thus ending the line at that point.

Harriet Josephine Weedman, was the only offspring to have married and had children.

Harriet Josephine Weedman Brodix

Josephine Weedman as she was known married **Charles Raymond Brodix** of Bloomington IL in 1882.

He was married to my mother on Nov 22 most likely 1938 in New London, Mo. He went to High school in Macomb, Ill. He was a taxi driver around 1938-1939. When he left Macomb, Ill he went to Quincy, Ill area. I believe his sisters were older than him. I believe his fathers name was John W. Weedman born in Sweden in 1856 naturalized in 1880 Knox Co Ill. I believe his mothers name was Mattie L. Warner born 1881 in Ill. Married in Knox Co. Ill. in 1904. Somewhere along the line comes a Johal Weedman born June 24 1829 in Sweden. And Jonas Wiman Weedman Hedberg, born June 24 1829 in Sweden. Mary was born in Sweden. Whose mother she was I do not know or how she fits in. I believe John Willard (Willy) date of death was July 1983 in Quincy Ill. I hope to find out someday how to get a hold of the Obits in Quincy for that period of time. Quincy has 3 cemeteries. Only one lists people buried there on the internet. I hope this helps both of us. Happy hunting. Ellen"

This triggered research, primarily focused on census records. Since the family originated (or so we thought) with **Olaf** and **Brita** (**Andersdotter**) **Weedman** who emigrated in 1855 and settled in Copley Township, Knox County, Illinois the census records should provide an excellent picture of this family and it's descendents.

But, it became clear that **John W. Weedman** did not originate with **Olaf Weedman!** While far from being an expert on this line, it was believed that <u>all</u> of the Swedish Weedman families in this country were descended from **Olaf** and **Brita Weedman**. Not so!

It appears there were probably three or four brothers who immigrated with Olaf being the initial traveler. While we have no proof of relationship, it is highly likely that Olaf born in 1821 had the following brothers: **Jonas** or **Janus Weedman**, born 1829 in Sweden, and possibly **Peter Weedman** born May 1834 in Sweden.

Further in our research, we found that one subscriber to the *Newsletter* has done what appears to be extensive research on this line. **Karen Perkins Lovell** of St. Louis MO has put much work on the **Olaf Weedman** line on Ancestry.com. Her research seems to confirm what we have found.

Since we have published some in the past on **Olaf Weedman**, we will show what has been found on the other two apparent brothers.

In the 1900 Knox Co., IL census **Peter** and **Mary Weedman** appear. Peter was born in May, 1834 in Sweden and had married **Mrs. Mary Ironberg** on 18 Dec 1899 according to Illinois marriage records. Mary had formerly been mar-

ried to **Peter Ironberg** and appears to have been divorced from him (this is unproven). **Peter Weedman's** first wife according to **Karen Lovell's** work was **Betsey Weedman**, born 23 Feb 1830 in Sweden and who died 4 Mar 1896. She is buried in Victoria, Knox County, IL. The 1900 census shows that **Peter Weedman** arrived in this country in 1882 and was naturalized. There appear to have been no children from the marriage of **Peter** and **Mary (Ironberg) Weedman**. We were unable to find **Peter** and **Betsey Weedman** in the 1880 census and do not know of descendents from that couple.

The apparent lineage of the person who made the inquiry must come from **Janas** and **Mary Weedman**. They are found in the 1870 Knox County, IL census living adjacent to **Olaf** and **Brita Weedman** and were ages 41 and 36 respectively both born in Sweden. Three children are shown: **Charles** (age 17), **John** (age 14) and **Mary** (age 12). In the 1900 census for Dayton, Webster County, Iowa is found **Janus Weedman** aged 70 (born July 1829 in Sweden) and **Maria** aged 74 (born October 1824 in Sweden). The census reveals the couple had three children all of whom were living. A county land ownership map for 1875 shows that a **C. Weedman** owned a section of land.

Unsuccessful attempts were made to research cemetery records on Webster Co., Iowa for any of this family.

In the 1910 Knox County, IL census, **John** and **Martha Weedman** ages 51 and 29 respectively are listed along with two daughters, **Mary** age 3 and **Maude** 7 months old (the census was taken 16 April 1910). John's occupation was a hardware retail merchant and the family resided in the village of Victoria. This fits with the description provided by the inquirer.

In the 1920 Knox Co. census, **J. W.** and **Mattie Weedman**, ages 62 and 39, are listed with children **Mary E.** (13), **Maude** (10), and **J. Willard** (4). J. W. was a grocery retailer.

No listing for J. W. or Mattie Weedman could be found in 1930 but living in Galesburg was **Chester** and **Mary Woolsey** both 23 years old with **Willard Weedman**, a brother (obviously to Mary), age 14 and attending school. Chester was a dairy route salesman. The couple had been married for 4 years.

We conclude that **John Willard Weedman** was a son of **John** and **Martha or Mattie Weedman**. He was a grandson of **Janus or Jonas** and **Mary Weedman**. It is highly likely but yet unproved that **Olaf Weedman**, **Peter Weedman**, and **John Weedman** were all brothers. The line has been researched in Sweden and lineage can be provided.

One aspect of this is the confusing conventions used in Sweden on surnames. Larson, for example, was a son of Lars whose surname would be totally different from that of his son. Andersdotter would be a daughter of Anders and have a different surname. We are friends with a lady from Sweden who confirmed this naming convention and did not know its origins or when the practice changed. How **Olaf Weedman** who was a son of **Olaf** and **Karin** (**Larsdotter**) **Larson** is a mystery to me! We have two subscribers to the *Newsletter* who descend from this line and perhaps they can shed light on the family.

It seems most of the family of **Olaf Weedman** remained in Knox County, IL except for his son, Alfred who moved to McLean Co., IL and **William Lewis Weedman** who moved first to western Iowa, then Nebraska and finally Kansas. We will publish more on this line when materials are available.

John Huhn Weedman, Jr. And his Descendents

(This is a continuation of an article that appeared in the Fall 2007 issue of the **Weedman Newsletter**. John H. Weedman, Jr. was the most successful family member up until his death. He left a considerable estate and a number of people wondered about the fate of his children and descendents. This article is an attempt to answer those questions.)

There is one correction to make in the article that was in the Fall 2007 issue. Subsequent research revealed that **John Sherman Weedman** had been married. In the 1900 census for Indianapolis, Marion Co., IN, he is shown as a hotel clerk but his wife does not appear to be residing in the same quarters. No marriage record has been found in either Indiana or Illinois for him. The census shows that he had been married for four years when the census was taken. We know that he died in 1908 after being confined to an institution. The hotel at which he was a clerk was at 232 South Illinois Street in Indianapolis which was downtown near the train station.

The remaining child of John H. and Mary Ann Weedman was Harriet Josephine Weedman.

Josephine Weedman, as she was known, was born 21 December 1857 in McLean Co., IL. We have found reference to her attending college but those details are not known. On 21 December 1881, she married **Charles Raymond Brodix** of Bloomington, IL who was a son of **William T.** and **Mary (Wicks) Brodix**. The Brodix family had lived in Indiana and had moved to Illinois in the 1860s. Both William T. and Charles Raymond Brodix were shown as book agents in the 1880 census.

Charles R. Brodix entered the publishing business and owned publishing companies in Chicago and in Washington, D.C. In the 1890s, advertising can be found in newspapers in many places in the country advertising books by the Brodix Publishing Company. It is unclear whether the publishing company was successful. Reference was found to a judgment against the company in November 1892 in which the company failed to pay a debt for printing that had been done for one of the political parties in Washington, D.C. It appears matters were resolved in due course. Another reference shows that the company published the Brodix Business Directory of Washington D.C. for 1886/87. In an 1890 City Directory for Washington D.C., Charles R. Brodix appears as the President of Brodix Publishing Company, 1425 Stoughton N.W., in the District of Columbia.

Charles and **Josephine** (**Weedman**) **Brodix** apparently had five children:

John Weedman Brodix, born 9 Oct 1882 in IL Charles Raymond Brodix, Jr. born 16 July 1884 in IL Mercedes Brodix, probably born about 1887 but this is uncertain Thomas Carter Brodix, born 10 October 1890 in Washington D.C. Josephine Brodix, born 6 Nov 1894 in Washington D.C.

The family was shown living in New Bloomfield Borough, Perry Co., PA in the 1900 census. All are shown as boarders in this census. **Josephine Brodix** is shown in that census as having borne five children, four of whom were living.

By 1910, the family had moved to Springfield Township, Burlington Co., NJ where it is believed they resided until the parents died. They operated a dairy farm at that location while Charles, the elder is shown as an exporter in foreign trade. It is unknown what happened to the publishing company. The three sons all appeared to have attended

Columbia University in New York City.

Charles Raymond Brodix, Jr.

Born in 1884 in Illinois, Charles attended law school at Columbia University. He was admitted to the New York bar on 18 May 1915 and appears to have practiced law in New York City. He married **Louise Williams** on 8 Nov 1929 in New York City and they appear in the 1930 census living on 86th Street. There were apparently no children of this marriage. He died in Feb 1971 in New York City according to the Social Security Death Index. Attempts to learn more about him through obituaries, etc. have not been successful.

Thomas Carter Brodix

Born in 1890 in the District of Columbia, it is believed that he attended Columbia University but this has not been confirmed. He was a 2nd Lieutenant in the 26th and 30th Aero Squadron in World War I. He married **Elizabeth C. Connolly** on 2 Jul 1927 in New York City. It is unknown what occupation he pursued although at the time of his death, he was running publishing company for his brother-in-law, **Louis M. Merryman**, in Baltimore. He died 21 Dec 1948 in Baltimore. A nephew recalls taking the ashes of **Thomas C. Brodix** to a cemetery in New Jersey. The cemetery is the Upper Springfield Cemetery in Springfield Township, Burlington Co., N.J. There were apparently no children of this marriage.

Josephine Brodix

Born in 1894 in D.C., she married **Louis McLane Merryman**, **Sr.** about 1919. The pair apparently eloped and for their early years lived on one of the channel islands between England and France. Merryman descended from an old line Maryland family and was raised on a farm at Sparks, Maryland that has been in the family since the 1700s. **Louis Merryman** served in the Roosevelt administration as head of the Milk Administration. He was a livestock breeder and gentleman farmer. Prominent in Maryland politics, he served in the State Legislature and in Baltimore County governmental positions.

There were apparently five children born to this couple:

- 1. Louis McLane Merryman, Jr., born 23 Oct 1920 in MD. Died 24 Sept 1953.
- 2. John Brodix Merryman, born 29 Oct 1922 in MD, died 23 Jan 1993 in MD.
- 3. **Josephine Merryman**, born 27 Feb 1925 in MD, married a Mr. Van Ness, died 9 Dec 1997 in Santa Barbara, CA.
- 4. Elizabeth Merryman, born about 1929 in MD.

There was probably one other child and, if research has proven correct, that person is living so we will forego specifics.

The **Merryman** line of the family has descendents and are the **only ones remaining** in the line of **John Huhn** and **Mary Ann Weedman**.

But, we have omitted one other son of **Charles R., Sr.** and **Harriet Josephine** (**Weedman**) **Brodix**. **John Weedman Brodix** attended Columbia University and achieved a number of leadership positions while in attendance. We will continue with his biography in the Spring 2008 issue. **John Weedman Brodix** married but had no children as far as we know. But, he had an interesting life which was terminated accidentally. Details will be provided in the next issue.
