Swedish Weedman Lines Revisited

In the last issue of the Newsletter, we published an inquiry from someone looking for the lineage of J. Willard Weedman. Research found John Willard Weedman and in the course of doing the work, we were surprised to learn there were three distinct Swedish Weedman families in this country rather than one. We previously believe all of the Swedish Weedman families that lived around Galesburg, Knox County, IL originated with Olaf Weedman. The two others were Peter Weedman and Jonas or Janus Weedman. John Willard Weedman was a descendant of the latter.

Then, we received an e-mail from Ann Weedman Murchison of Lexington, VA who wrote:

"...Dear Nick, to say that I was surprised by the info in the latest newsletter is an understatement--I'm breathless, speechless, weirded out. You printed a request for knowledge about John Williard Weedman on page 29-30 from "Ellen" on behalf of her older half brother. "Willard" is my father. Her info on the birth and death of my father are accurate. We never knew a lot about my dad because of his being so young when his parents died and he just never talked about himself. We knew bits and pieces but certainly not a previous marriage...which may or may not explain the mystery. I have an older sister named Martha who was named for Mattie. I grew up being told...had I only been a boy....I would have been John Willard Weedman the Third...alas, I'm just a girl. To think that I might have a half brother is a little like something from the Twilight Zone. What do you make of this, Nick?

(You may recall my stories and inquiries from a view years back...my grandfather being called "Hey, Swedeman" by an immigration official; a steamer trunk refinished --paint removed--to discover initials...) A couple of folks wrote to me-but I have been out of touch--very bad of me.)...".

Given there were two separate families with a common parent, how do you proceed from that point?

Contact was made with both families and arrangements were made for Jim Weedman of St. Louis MO to call his newly found half-sister on her birthday, January 25th. Here is her report:

"...Hey, Nick! Guess what! Jim and I spoke on my birthday! What a great gift! He sounds very nice and we spoke a long while. It was a very good talk--it was a little overwhelming when I would truly think about with whom I was speaking and I think we both fell victim to "information overload." I need to catch my breath a bit and organize my questions so that they are not just spurts, sputters, gasps and general randomness—I know we will talk again soon..."

There are currently efforts to exchange pictures and there have been further contacts made. We are pleased that we have been able to facilitate this connection and trust that they will meet in person.

We will be attempting to learn more about the two newly found Weedman families that were discovered in this research. **Peter Weedman** appeared to remain in Knox County but **Jonas Weedman** moved with his son to **Webster County, Iowa.** Both appear to be brothers of **Olaf Weedman.** Olaf emigrated about 1857 while the other two arrived in the early 1880s.

If there is sufficient interest we would like to find someone to contribute a regular article on the Swedish lines of the Weedman family for periodic publication in the Weedman Newsletter.

John Weedman Brodix

(In the last two issues of the Weedman Newsletter, we have traced the descendents of John Huhn and Mary Ann (McDonald) Weedman, Jr. We showed that the two sons who lived to adulthood (Cassius M. Clay Weedman and John Sherman Weedman) died without issue and both died in mental institutions. Two daughters survived and married. One, Rachael, married Thomas V. Young and ultimately moved to Dallas, TX. We could find no children of this marriage. Only one daughter, Harriet Josephine Weedman, who married Charles Raymond Brodix had children. It was shown there were three sons, none of whom apparently had children. A daughter, Josephine, married Louis McLane Merryman about 1919 and had children with a number of descendents living today. The Merryman's are Maryland pioneers.

One of the Brodix sons achieved some success and he is chronicled here. This is the conclusion of the series of articles on this family.)

John Weedman Brodix was the first child and oldest son of **Charles Raymond and Harriet Josephine (Weedman) Brodix.** He was born in Chicago on 9 October 1882 and attended Columbia University where he was very active. John was a track star and headed the University track team. He was President of his Senior Class and was active in the Debating Society as well as a number of other extra curricular activities. Following his graduation from Columbia, he was broker in the banking business (1920 census Springfield Township, Burlington Co., NJ).

He married the widow of **David Stuart Mann** of Warrenton, VA, **Julia Malcoskey Mann**, on 16 October 1923 in New York City. The couple filed for passports in November so they could travel Europe for an extended period and sailed on 10 November 1923.

It appears the marriage did not last and by 1930, John was living with his brother on the New Jersey farm.

At some point, he became associated with **Cornelius Vanderbilt** and was his personal secretary. He travelled extensively with Vanderbilt and appeared to have been more of a close personal friend rather than an employee. Newspapers in the 1920s and 1930s reveal them travelling to Indiana to visit John's cousin in Indianapolis and trying for a time to find gold in Nevada. Brodix was in one of Vanderbilt's several weddings!

On 23 December 1923, Brodix and Vanderbilt were travelling in separate cars from California back to the East Coast. Vanderbilt was going to meet **President Roosevelt** and Brodix was travelling to be with his sister's family in Maryland. They stopped near the West Virginia-Pennsylvania border and Brodix went from his car to Vanderbilt's to talk. Another car, driven by a miner who was under the influence of alcohol, hit and killed Brodix. There were a number of articles in papers around the country about the accident fueled, no doubt, by the association with Vanderbilt.

John Weedman Brodix was buried in the family plot in Upper Springfield Cemetery in Burlington Co., NJ. As far as could be determined, there were no children of John Brodix's marriage.

Research has been done to determine if there might be Brodix relatives but only four people in the U.S. have this surname and they are spread from Alaska to Texas to North Carolina.

The conclusion is the only descendents of **John H.** and **Mary Ann Weedman, Jr.** are those in the family of **Louis M.** and **Josephine** (**Brodix**) **Merryman** from Maryland. The success that **John Huhn Weedman, Jr.** achieved in his lifetime could have been the foundation of a family legacy. But this appears to have not happened.

It should be noted that in 1892, the surviving family of **John Huhn Weedman**, **Jr.** donated land to the Farmer City, IL for a park that is known as **Weedman Park**. It was there that participants enjoyed a picnic lunch during the 2000 Weedman Reunion.

I did not find them in the 1920 census.



Widman Family Possible Connections

A few items I'm researching. I've come across so many items recently; I'm not even sure where to start. Thought I'd run them by you to see if you've already heard of these items and already researched them before I waste my time:

- I) I've come across a few "Widman" arrivals before Christian. The list follows. There is usually more than one source to each passenger list. I just listed one for each:
- A) On a possibly more connected note, I came across a reference to a **Hendrick Widman**, 38 who arrived in Philadelphia October 2, 1741 aboard the ship St. Andrew. It originated in an unspecified port in Germany. I'd have liked it better had his name been one of Christian's kids names (i.e. he'd named one after this guy), but it was not to be. I'm starting some research around him, but perhaps he is related to one of the other Weedman families.

B) I also found a **Michael Widman**, 24, who arrived in Philadelphia on board the ship Hampshire on September 7, 1748. The shipped sailed from Rotterdam and Falmouth.

C) Another reference to a Widman - **Johan Friederick Widman** - says that he arrived aboard the ship Dragon September 26, 1749. The ship originated in Rotterdam, though it says the "foreigners" were from "the palatinate and Zweibrucken".

- D) OK, but here's a really compelling one. I found a ship that arrived in Baltimore, Maryland from Rotterdam much later than our **Christian Widman** arrived. This ship, the Leila, arrived September 14, 1852. However, passengers 260 through 265 caught my eye:
 - 260 **Christian Widman**, 42, Wurtemberg Farmer
 - 261 Christina Sibylla Widman, 49, Wurtemberg
 - 262 **Veronika Widman**, 17, Wurtemberg
 - 263 Johann Martin Widman, 10, Wurtemberg
 - 264 Christian Friedr. Widman, 13, Wurtemberg
 - 265 Christina Widman, 9, Wurtemberg
- OK, so Christian would be a relatively common name in Germany still I'm researching further. Wurtemberg is a reference to a state in Germany, but as I said, I'm researching further.

- E) I also found reference to a **Freidrick Widman** and (I assume) his 16 year old son of the same name that arrived in New York in the late 1800s from Germany aboard the Steamship Maas, but it was late enough I don't plan to follow it up.
- II) I found this interesting genealogical reference to a **Barbara Widman**, born in 1706 in Germany to **Hans** and **Maria Widman** and then came over on board the ship "Ann Galley" sailing from Rotterdam and arriving in Philadelphia in 1746. Since one of Christian's first daughters' names was Barbara, it intrigued me, but the father and mother's name doesn't leave me with much hope since no children after that were named Hans or Maria. I've attached the reference I read:
- 1805 Johann Philip ZIEGLAR was born 19 June, 1706 at Groetzinger, Wurttemberg, Germany. He married Bar-

bara (Widman) ZIEGLAR on 20 April, 1728 in Germany. She was the daughter of Hans and Maria (Nonnenmacher) WIDMAN, and was born on 7 Jan., 1706 at Gniebel, Wurttemberg, Germany. They migrated to America with several of their children in 1746, sailing from Rotterdam, Holland in the ship "Ann Galley", commanded by William Wilson. The ship stopped at the British Orkney Islands before proceeding on to Philadelphia, arriving on 27 Sept., 1746. On that day Johann took the British oath of allegiance before the "Honourable George Thomas, Esq., Lt. Governor of Pennsylvania". The German records indicate that the Zieglers departed with five children, while the American records indicate that they arrived with four children, indicating that one child may have died en route. They settled in the "Germantown" area close to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Johann is mentioned twice in the newspaper Pennsylvanische Geschichts-Schreiber, (also called the "Sower's Newspaper"), on 16 February 1750 and again on 16 October1752. Both newspaper accounts stated that he was living in Ridge Valley, Upper Salford Township, Philadelphia County (now Montgomery County), Pennsylvania. They had eight children, all of whom were born in Groetzingen:

Philipp ZEIGLER born 2 June, 1729, died 8 Nov., 1730

Anna Dorthea ZEIGLER

Johann Georg ZEIGLEN, born 1 March, 1732 (or 1733), died 15 March, 1732 (or 1733)

Johannes ZEIGLER, born 14 May, 1734

Johann Jacob ZEIGLER

Agatha ZEIGLER, born 4 Nov., 1739

Joseph ZEIGLER, born 6 Oct., 1741, died 4 April, 1742

Anna Marie ZEIGLER, born 15 Nov., 1743

(Editor's note: The reference to Gniebel is of particular interest. We know that a Christian Widman was born there in 1735 and died soon thereafter. This appears to show there were several Widmans born there and further investigation of church records in that immediate area appear to be in order.)

Mark your calendars now and make your travel plans to attend this event. This Reunion will take us back to the homestead that was called "**New Holland**" by **Christian, Sr.** and **Elizabeth Weedman.** This was the home where most of our ancestors were born and raised.

Here are planned events:

Friday, June 20, 2007 – arrive, mingle, and discuss how the family got to Fayette County, PA from Hampshire Co., VA. Tentatively, we hope to have **Judge Sumner Walters**, a descendent of **Ephraim Walters** talk about his ancestor and the colorful history of this man. The story is intriguing.

Saturday, June 21, 2007 – travel to Jacobs Lutheran Church where the family worshipped (the original church is no longer there), visit the cemetery and then go to nearby "New Holland". We will then travel to Fort Necessity, the site of George Washington's only military defeat and will see living conditions in the second half of the 1700s.

Widman (n) Connections

We received an interesting e-mail from **Robert Widmann** of New York City recently and publish it here. Robert is a serious Widman(n) genealogical researcher. Here is his note:

Dear Nick and Weedman relations -

Congratulations to Shawn Wiley for some excellent scholarship regarding family origins. I have in the past contributed some ideas re these origins and may have included information about a piece published in Germany on the mid-1950's having to do with the origin of my family line and that of many if not most present-day Widmann's. (The double n is often dropped by English speaking record makers who in general tended to Anglicize German names and wh also unfamiliar with the Germa of writing the name with one n, cating a double n by an underli last n.)

My 1st translation of the above article: Two Doctors Named Johann Widmann may be found on www.worldroots.com/brigitte/widm.htm (I did not place the copyright marks, Brigitte did.)

Also, my notes show immigration of **Johannes Widmann** on Oct.7, 1743 via the ship St. Andrew sailing from Rotterdam. My notes indicate there seems to have been also a Wittman (sp.?) aboard.

The following books may prove helpful: **Pennsylvania Pioneers** by Strassberger & Hinke and also the **Volumes of The Pennsylvania German Society**. (As of a few years ago, this Society was still very active.)

recently moved the site to GoDaddy.com.

We are highly appreciative of the support shown by Adam and Affiniscape over the years.

The move will be transparent to subscribers and although we lost e-mail service for 48 hours in the transition, we are now stable. One thing we found was that many links were inoperative and thus made a number of changes to update or remove those links.

E-Mail Forwarding Through Weedman.org

With the move to a new hosting service, we are able to offer a limited number of

e-mail forwarding accounts. Initially, if you have attended any Reunion and are a current subscriber to the *Weedman Newsletter*, we will offer the service at no cost.

Essentially, what this does is to provide an e-mail address which is forwarded to your current e-mail service. For example, nick@weedman.org is the address that I use. My actual e-mail address is weed-man54@mchsi.com. When an e-mail is addressed to nick@weedman.org, it goes to that address at GoDaddy.com and is immediately forwarded to weed-man54@mchsi.com.

Second, your actual e-mail address does not change so no action is really needed on your part. Third, if you do change your e-mail provider, no action is needed by people who send you e-mail since the administrator simply changes

2008 Weedman National Family Gathering

The 13th biennial Weedman Family Reunion was held June 19-21 in Uniontown and Masontown, PA. There were 58 participants at the event.

The event was based at the Uniontown Holiday Inn and hosted by Billie Lou Weedman Bruce and Nick Weedman.

Participants arrived on Friday afternoon and were greeted by a meeting room filled with Weedman memorabilia and posters. An evening session was held to discuss plans for the Reunion and why it was being held in Uniontown.

The theme was a "Visit to New Holland" to recognize the name of the homestead that **Christian** and **Elizabeth Weedman, Sr.** gave to the land they received by grant from the Pennsylvania government. It appears they first settled the land between 1765 and 1769 and remained there until it was sold in 1799.

Using land maps, GIS systems and help from the Fayette County government, we have been able to confirm the location of the land with certainty. So, the event was to take interested ancestors back to the original homestead.

There are no original buildings left from the homestead but it is still relatively undeveloped. The northern boundary of the 400+ acre tract is common with the City of Masontown city limits. It was felt that many would be interested in seeing how the land appeared and nobody was disappointed in the beautiful site.

There were a number of displays, some of which had been used at previous reunions but there were many new ones as well. Following the Friday evening structured session, quite a few stayed to visit and socialize.

Jacobs Lutheran Church Visit

On Saturday morning, a cavalcade of vehicles headed toward the **Jacob's Lutheran Church** located near McClellandtown. This is where at least one of the children of **Christian** and **Elizabeth Weedman** were married (**Catherine**, the youngest daughter married **John Huhn**, **Jr.** here) and where many of the grandchildren were christened. Interestingly, while we find repeated reference to the children and grandchildren, we cannot find a single instance of Christian and/or Elizabeth sponsoring a grandchild at the christening ceremony.

We toured the old part of the cemetery and found the grave of **Nicholas Riffle** who was the husband of **Barbara Weedman.** In addition, a number of Huhn and Riffle burial sites were viewed. Of particular interest were the graves of **John** and **Dorady** (**Dorothy?**) **Huhn, Sr.** who are progenitors of eve-

ryone in the **George Weedman** line. Two of the Huhn offspring married children of **Christian** and **Elizabeth Weedman**, so several of the participants had the opportunity of seeing graves of their direct ancestors.

The Jacobs Lutheran Church cemetery is well kept and has a number of Revolutionary War Veterans buried here.

In the old part of the Jacobs Lutheran Church cemetery is a marker that shows the names of people known to have been buried there. There is a story that when the road passing in front of the Church was constructed, a number of graves were simply built over and stones were simply discarded. Whether this is actually true is not known. The stone is shown above right and while the names are unreadable here the idea has great merit. We have seen this one other time and that was in the old cemetery in Jasper, IN in which **Jonathan Weedman** is buried.

eration.

There is a marker in the cemetery that the first burial was that of a child of **A**. **M. Riffle**. The marker, a bronze plaque mounted on a granite stone, states that the child's burial was handled by **Barbara Brandenberg** who, from other records, was active in the church and was a talented singer. The relationship of this Riffle family with that of **Nicholas Riffle** is unproven at this point. Subsequent to the Reunion, we contacted the cemetery sexton to ask if our family could install a similar plaque or something similar. The Cemetery Committee has asked for specifics for their consid-

New Holland and Fairview Brethern Church

Christian Weedman's homestead was named "New Holland" for reasons unknown to us. In Fayette County, homesteads were usually named with many having an obvious origin. Whether he was naming this for his native county or whether he had lived in New Holland, PA prior to the move to Hampshire County, VA where his first child was born is unknown.

Maps of the area showing the original land grants abound. A book known as Horn's Papers is well known although many scholars feel that some of the work was fabricated. But, we have copies of the original land maps from the Pennsylvania Archives and have located the land on Fayette County records. It is known that there were some 302 1/2 acres in the grant.

Because the land was in a disputed area that was claimed by both Pennsylvania

and Virginia, it was only when the Mason-Dixon line was accepted as the boundary between the states did settlers bother to record their grants.

It was known that the Fairview Brethern Church was on land of the original homestead. This was confirmed with a court house search in which land was donated by **Ephraim Walters**, **Jr**. to the church board for a church site. So, by going to this Church, we know we were on "New Holland". We were able to find the deed in which it states that the land originally belonged to **Christian Weedman** who sold it to **Ephraim Walters**, **Sr**. who in turn sold it to his son, **Ephraim Walters**, **Jr**.

Connie Honsaker, a descendent of the **DeBolt** family (**Ephraim Walters** married **Mary DeBolt**), met us at the Church and let us use the facility to brief the family. Connie is a member of the Church. While there, we discussed the history of the Weedman and Walters families in this area. Connie's picture is on the preceding page.

Outside, we took the view that our ancestors had. Clearly, they selected the highest elevation in the area and had an excellent view to the north toward Masontown. In an article that **Dr. Jefferson Walters** had written for a Fayette County newspaper, the *Genius of Liberty*, in 1879, he told of the land being conveyed from **Christian Weedman** to **Ephraim Walters, Sr.** to Ephraim Walters Jr. and finally to the German Baptist Church of George's Creek. He stated that the log home built by Weedman was "across the road" from the Church. Numerous pictures were taken on the visit.

The 300+ acre site goes from the location of the Fairvew Church to the southern border of Masontown. On the advice of the mapping office at the Fayette County Courthouse, we believe that some of the hedgerows running north and south delineate the east and west borders of the property. It is in deed a beautiful site that only be appreciated with a personal visit.

Fort Necessity



Following the visit to New Holland, the group traveled to the eastern side of Fayette County to visit the site of Fort Necessity. This was a site of a battle in the French and Indian War (also called the Seven Years War) in 1754 in which General George Washington participated and was the only battle in which he surrendered to an enemy.

There are displays and demonstrations at this site that shows what living conditions were like in the late 1750s which is about the time our ancestors came to the area. Clearly, they were pioneers and this visit enabled us to see what they faced.

Lunch was served and the group participated in tours of the newly built visitor center and the surrounding displays.

Many went to an historic home on the Fort Necessity Battlefield National Park called the Mount Washington Tav-

ern. This was built as a stage coach stop on what became the National Road. The value of this visit was the excellent displays to provide a flavor for living conditions in the second half of the 1700s.

Another point of historical significance relates to what became the National Road. The Colonial Government hired Indians to cut a road through the wilderness going from the Potomac River in Virginia (now West Virginia) to a point on the Ohio River which was in Fayette County. This was called Nemacolin's Path or Braddock's Road. It is likely that our ancestors travelled this road when they left Hampshire County, VA to settle in Fayette County.

Weedman DNA Project

The use of DNA analysis in genealogy is a relatively new but rapidly growing feature in this field. We suggested at one of the Reunions that we consider doing a Weedman family DNA project but, until recently, that suggestion went unheeded.

Bill and **Thea Weedman** recently contacted us and advised they wanted to pursue DNA testing. Here is what they said:

"Thea and I are thinking about taking DNA testing for both the paternal and maternal sides (both for male and only maternal for female). There is an excellent article in the November/December issue of AARP, The magazine. If you do not receive the magazine, you can check out www.aarpmagazine.org. There are several companies listed and we are considering www.familytreedna.com; we recall that you had written something about the Weedman males participating in a project but have not been able to find the information. On the Family Tree DNA web site, there is a one member Weedman DNA participant, I don't know if this is you or some one else."

That prompted a deeper look into the possibility of DNA testing for genealogical purposes and I am convinced this could be an excellent tool in our pursuit of our ancestry.

Here are some objectives that could be pursued with such a project:

- 1) Determine if the Christian Weedman, Sr. line has any relationship with the Florida Weedman line. We know where the Florida line originated in Germany and if we establish there is a common male ancestor within a reasonable number of generations, we might have a better clue of our origins.
- 2) Determine if the three apparent Swedish Weedman lines do indeed have a common ancestor. We know there were apparently three brothers who came to this country but proof they were siblings has not been established. There may not be male descendants of each of the three brothers but there are from two.
- 3) Determine if the Christian Weedman, Sr. line has a common male ancestor with the Swedish lines.
- 4) Determine if the Widman(n) family and the Christian Weedman, Sr. lines share a common male ancestor. If this proves correct, it may show that the original spelling of our surname was in fact, Widman or Widmann.
- 5) Determine if the Weidman family which has numerous connections in Lancaster County, PA is closely related to the Christian Weedman, Sr. family.

We found there is already one Weedman family member who has completed DNA testing with FamilyTreeDNA and the editor will be the second. This will be a start and we encourage others to do the same to help provide increased confidence in the conclusions that may be reached in the study.

We will need volunteers for this project and the cost will be about \$100 for a Y-DNA12 test. See the Family Tree DNA site for more details.

The use of DNA in genealogy is growing. A successful project could help us find our European roots.

Photographs of the children of Zadock Sinclair Weedman

My daughter, **Amy Weedman**, recently ran across a number of photographs of the children of **Zadock Sinclair Weedman** on eBay. She purchased those and gave them to me as a gift. I have put all on the web site (www.weedman.org/zadock.htm) and will show one in this article.

Zadock S. Weedman was the third son of **George** and **Catherine** (**Danner**) **Weedman** and was born 22 November 1862 in Farmer City, IL. He married **Matilda Jane** (**Jennie**) **Romine** on 28 February 1887 in Farmer City. They had four children, all of whom were born in Illinois. They were: **Minnie Fern**, born 21 December 1887; **Daisy Fay**, form 12 February 1890; **Georgia Sinclair**, born 16 January 1893; and **Lois B.**, born 18 December 1893.

In the 1900 census, the family was living in McLean Co., IL where **Zadock** (or Dock as he was known) was shown as a grain merchant in West Township where the town of Weedman, IL was located. Some time between that census and 1907, the family moved to Kansas and they appear in the 1910 census living in Holy-



rood, Ellsworth County. **Zadock** was shown as the proprietor of an automobile garage. This is a town near Great Bend, KS.

By 1920, the family had located in South Haven, Sumner Co., Kansas. **Zadock** died 8 August 1925 in South Haven and is buried in the Rose Hill Cemetery there. **Jennie** died in South Haven 28 February 1949 and is also buried in the Rose Hill Cemetery.

The two oldest daughters married brothers. **Fern** married **Maximillian Ebenezer Church** on 16 May 1907 in Kansas City while **Fay** married **Philip Merrick Church** on 21 February 1909.

Georgia never married. Lois B. married Clifford Nelson-Smith on 10 December 1914.

The families appeared to remain in Sumner County, KS or in Tulsa, OK. A long time supporter and subscriber of the Weedman Newsletter was the eldest child of **Fern** and **Max Church**, **Hila Bernadean Church** who was born 7 December 1907 and died 14 January 2001 in Tulsa, OK.

The photographs we have obtained include:

- Fay and Philip Church
- Hila B. Church with Lois B. Weedman in 1910

Shown on the left is the photograph of **Fay Weedman** which was taken by the **F. A. Wesely's Photo Art Studio** in Holyrood. This could be a high school graduation photo but we are uncertain about this.

We are extremely pleased to have obtained these photographs and are happy to share them on our web site.

It should be noted that **Abraham Lincoln Weed-man**, a brother of **Zadock**, and his family also moved from Illinois and settled in Anthony, Kansas which is near South Haven.


Alabama Newspaper Article
