On Thursday, October 13, 1983, Mildred (Lanman) Holman lost her beloved husband, Lloyd J. Holman, age 50. He had suffered a heart attack at work at Martin-Marietta Aircraft Co., in Owensboro. He was born in Tell City, Ind., a son of Joseph and Mathilda (Greulich) Holman. He had served in Korea and Viet Nam and had retired from the US Marines. He had earned many service medals and honors. Survivors besides wife Mildred, are 1 daughter, Deborah Huff, four sons, Michael, Anthony, Timothy and Stephen Holman. Both Lloyd and Aunt Ollie (Mary Lanman) were buried in St Mary's Cemetary in Tell City. Services were held in St Paul's Catholic Church. Lloyd was given full military honors. DANIEL's line.

Early scouts explored and surveyed the land around Harrods Fort in early day Kentucky County, Virginia, now known as Mercer County, KY. There were a number of menacing Indian raids in the area where the first encampment was established, and among the men sent to quell the uprising and guard the new fort, Ed believes was one Christian Wittman. Also possibly a John Marshel. We have no documentary details of this incident, but Ed is researching it to find out of this Wittman was indeed <u>our</u> Christian WEEDMAN. In those days names were spelled any way the writer took a fancy, so the spelling doesn't bother us. The first families came to the fort about 1783-4, and even then the preparations mentioned above (1776-1777) were not fully enough to protect the fort from Indian raids. What if any, was our ancestor Christian Weedman's part in establishing the Fort? And did Mary Marshel's family move there among the very first settlers? Was her father's name John? We'll keep you up to date as this information is available.

The tax seems a bit steep and I wonder if I got that right....or perhaps it really isn't that steep..... for all that he had. No, I guess it was fair.

Others listed in the tax lists were names very familiar to us, whose descendents went to Ohio and Illinois, and to Kentucky in the next century.

Samuel, James and David WILSON, NIcholas, George and Matthew RIFFLE, Esther BISHOP, William Hawkins, John Gilliland and several WALTERS. A lovely Christmas letter came in the mail just now from Christine and Jim Wickman, Jim's progress is slow, but he's had no recurrance of past ill

health, the children, Jim, Marjorie and Betty and their families are well. Jim took an early retirement from his professorship at Univ. of Washington, but is not letting the grass grow up under his feet. He's very active in his church, and other areas. (JACOB's line.)
