His Blood Turned to Water

Genealogical records indicate that Willys Green Weedman, son of John Weedman, died at the relatively yound age of 39 years. Many, many years ago I inquired of my grandfather, John Franklin Weedman, eldest son of Willys Green, of the cause of death of his father. He solemnly replied, "his blood turned to water". Leukemia? Diabetes? Septicemia? Who knows? In that semi-primitive era the unavailability of doctors, death certificates, and morticians with their preservative techniques, the body was usually prepared and buried the following day in a crude pine box, often marked by a simple sand rock headstone.

Great-grandfather Willys Green, at 39 years left a grieving widow with nine children and herself eight months pregnant with her tenth child. If Great-grandfather Willys Green's death is perhaps something of a mystery, an even greater mystery is how did Great Grandmother Cassa Ellen and her many children survive in those perilous years? No Social Security, no widow's assistance or other survivor benefits. It was simply "sink or swim sister!" but survive they did!

Grandfather John Franklin was himself nineteen years of age, the eldest of the brook, but he never discussed the hardships incurred in those years. Possibly too unpleasant to reflect upon. Apparently they eked out a meager living on a small farm plot. At any rate, they did survive. Great grandmother Cassa Ellen later re-married, and the children lived into old age, apparently none inheriting any genetic defect from their father.

Possibly some more distinct record exists regarding the cause of death of Willys Green Weedman but as far as legend holds, "his blood turned to water".

Easter is coming up and what an appropriate time to introduce you to Mary Alice Weedman Fults.



The Weedman Cemetery is on a farm owned by Russell Flamion on the original William Weedman homestead. This is the only grave marked with a tombstone - there are nine others which are marked with simple, sand stones but the names of those buried there are only speculated.

All of the Weedmans listed here are primarily descended from Daniel (see page 5) or William shown above. Daniel's tombstone is the original while that of William was furnished by the U.S. Government at the request of relatives for his service during the War of 1812. William's descendents are buried primarily in Union and the Lillydale Cemetery while Daniel's are in Anderson, Clark, and Leopold Townships. The Weedmans buried in Troy and Tobin Townships are from the line of Christian Senior, Christian Junior, and John.

This concludes the listing of Weedman cemetery inscriptions in Perry County, Indiana. Again, our thanks to Becky Middleton for this valuable contribution to the Weedman Newsletter.

Great great grandson of JOHN Weedman through the line of WILLYS GREEN WEEDMAN, JOHN FRANKLIN WEEDMAN, and FONZO WEEDMAN. Born in Ohio Co., KY August 14, 1916; moved to Madisonville, KY in 1921; was raised and attended school there. Graduated Madisonville High School in 1934; attended Bryant & Stratton Business School through 1935. Married Luetta Lutz at Madisonville in 1936 and entered Railway Mail Service at Cincinnati, OH. Transferred to Louisville, KY in 1938, and to St Louis, MO in 1939.

Moved to Evansville, IN in 1941, serving on the C&EI line passenger trains between Chicago and Evansville. Transferred to Nashville, TN in 1942 running on L&N passenger trains Nashville to St Louis. Served in US Army from 1943-1946. Returned to Nashville at the end of WW II and continued on train service until all through mail and passenger trains were removed from service in 1966 (on the N&SL line). Transferred to a Supervisory position at the Nashville Post Office until retirement in 1971. We have travelled extensively since retirement primarily in Recreational Vehicle (camping) field. We have three sons: Daniel Wilson, (1942); Samuel Lee, (1947), and John Michael (1952).

Early Lines to be Researched

I have sent several queries concerning the allied WEEDMAN lines of Murphy, Hume/Huhn, Riffle, Myers, Kefauver, and Walters. Haven't received any replies on these names. In the taxpayers' list for Fayette County 1785 (township in parentheses):

Murphy, Jacob (Union)
Murphy, John (Union)
Murphy, Patrick (Tyrone)
Murphy, Samuel (Tyrone)
Murphy, Robert (Franklin)

I feel sure that one or all of these are somehow allied to the Weedmans in that Christian Weedman Sr.'s daughter. Elizabeth married a "Mr. Murphy". This marriage may have occurred in Fayette County, and it is not known if they went to Fairfield / Licking counties with the Weedmans or not. The Kefauvers and some of the Walters went. So we're thinking Fayette Co., PA and Fairfield, and or Licking Cos....and any other county in Ohio if a Weedman, Widman, Wedman, Weadman, Wiedman family is located there. Remember, however, that the name Weidman is usually pronounced Wide-man, and isn't ours,

and Wiedman is pronounced Weedman, but in many cases the spelling has been changed. Here are the families we want to learn more about:

Mary Weedman b. about 1761 and died after 1837 married Adam Myers and lived in Huron Co., Ohio.

Barbara b. about 1762 died before 1837, married Nicholas Riffle in 1781 in Fayette Co., PA. Nicholas was a Revolutionary War vet and is buried in Jacobs Lutheran Church cemetery in German Township, but no grave site is known for Barbara.

Elizabeth who married Mr. Murphy.

John, b. 1769 married Sophia
in Fayette Co. PA by 1801.
He died in 1830 in Licking Co. OH.
Sophia and her son, Nicholas Weedman, lived in Jackson County, Indiana. Apparently John and Sophia were either separated or divorced.

Margaret b. about 177l, nothing further known. Perhaps never married.

Sarah b, about 1772 died about 1809. Married Andrew Walters, son of Ephraim Walters. Several children were born in Fayette Co., PA and moved to Ohio about 1806 after selling the Walters homestead back to Ephraim, the original owner. May have died in Fairfield, Perry, or Licking Cos. Ohio.

Catherine, b. about 1779 married (1) John Huhn Jr., and after his death (2) Jacob Kefover. moved to Ohio. Believe she and Jacob died in Perry

County, Ohio.

We would like to fill in these families, and whereas Weedman is not a common name, it has been easier to find descendants of Christian SR., but Murphy, Myers, and Walters are quite common names, it is more difficult to determine if the ones in any given area are connected to our Weedmans. Huhn and Kefover/Kefauver would be easier to track down. Except for John, the names above are the females in the family. John's son, Nicholas' daughter, Mary Ann Weedman has been beautifully traced by Doris Kizer in the Ackerman family. There are still many blanks in the complete Weedman family, of course including allied names.

If anyone out there has time, and enjoys detective work, tracking down our Myers, etc. etc. names will be exciting for you. I only wish I had 48 hours in my day, and knew how to say "No" more often.

Please feel free to write to me; you have my address, and ask me any questions on the above that you want or need to know.

The other day I received an invitation to pass along to any of you who might be in the area at the time, or care to make a vacation to Idaho next summer. There will be an Ackerman Family Reunion July 28-30th at Hellsgate State Park, Lewiston, Idaho. They will be reserving rooms at the nearby Motel 6, and there are other motels in the area. The reunion is open to other than Ackerman, and this would surely include Weedmans.

Becky Middleton, while going through some items in her line of work at the library in Spencer County,...or was it the historical society? Don't have letter in front of me. but I do have some information, and I haven't published it before, so here it is.

Mrs. Albert VanWinkle and sons, Jimmie and Harold attended the funeral of her brother, Charles Weedman in Blytheville, AR. Mr. Weedman was born in Magnet, Perry County, and had lived there many years before making his home in Arkansas. He was married to Sis? Lanman and had reared several children. He was 83 years of age, and cause of death was a heart attack. Extracted from the New Boston news appearing June 18, 1950 in the Rockcestry of this man. He is Nick Weed-

man's grandfather, and Sis Lanman is Martha Lanman. Charles Green Weedman was born in Rono, Indiana Feb 2, 1864, He and Martha (Sis) had eight children, one of whom was Harry Edwin Weedman, Nick's dad. (WILLIAM's line). He's in Gena's book (pages 164-167 in the Revised (red) book. For the first several generations of each line from Christian. Jr. the name GREEN was a family name. Green Berry, Greenberry, Willis Green, etc. I am confident that there must have been a relationship between the Willis Green of early day Hardin/Grayson County who, by the way, had come there from Pennsylvania, and the Weedman family.

I may not live to know how or when or where, but I do hope someone else can solve this thing. Who was Willis Green in relation to our Christian Weedman? Now it is not carried out in the Illinois branches of the family...that is, in the descendants of JOHN and GEORGE....sons of Christian SR. nor in the Riffle and Walters lines of the daughters of Christian SR. So it nearly pinpoints to the fact that Christian Jr. somehow connects with the Greens. He didn't marry a Green. He married Mary Marshall, and unless Mary's mother's family were Greens, it could be that since Willis Green was such an important figure in early Grayson county, perhaps Christian Jr. just admired him, and named a son Willis Green Weedman for Willis Green. This is something Sarah, Ed Weedman's grandma, didn't tell him. He (as most of you recall) would give us a lot of information that "grandma Sarah" had told him. But she must

Ed and family never missed a one, but when he died, we not only missed him, but his family as well. Not only Ed, but the others whose names were recalled were faithful in attending, also.

Back to Becky Middleton's files. She found in the 1900 census

George Weedman age 39 b. IN, mother b. IN, father b. KY; Mollie Weedman, 31, b. IN, father b. OH, mother b. IN; (children) Lloyd Weedman, 12, b. IN; Ada Weedman, 10 b. IN; Ralph Weedman, 6, b. IN.

This couple had been married 15 years, had 6 children, of whom only three were living at time of this census. This was a Spencer County census, no town given. I looked in the Weedman Genealogy (revised) and find this to be Elizabeth Weedman Snodgrass' father (Ralph) and grandfather (George Perry). Molly was Molly Hatfield. I think that Ada was later called Edith, as the age given in the book matches that given on the census above. She married Milo Summerville. Lloyd moved to Mas-

cotte, FL and became the grandfather of our present-day cousin, George Perry Weedman. We were hoping to meet him and his family at the reunion, but he couldn't fit it into his plans this year. Maybe in 1996?. (WILLIAM's line).
