In 1985 she met and joined forces with the newly reformed Spencer County Historical Society and became it's first Vice President.

With three others, she compiled cemetery records of the area in three volumes. She has been tireless in working to get a place in the sun for the Spencer Co. society. In 1990 she was hired as a paid employee. She's seen the society grow from a trickle of people coming in, to over 3000 from all 50 states and Canada, into the genealogy section alone. Researchers such as lawyers, doctors, retired generals, admirals, genealogists, historians, state and national agencies and societies, students, teachers, etc. Becky has seen the society through good and lean times, and her care and attention and loyal service, both volunteer and paid staff, has brought forth a first class Historical Society for Spencer County.

The sign-in/sign-out book is filled with complimentary phrases about help they've received from Becky. again...here is another Weedman who has made a difference in her world. We salute you, Becky Middleton for your dedication not only to genealogy, but to history as well. We are proud that you are a Weedman!

Could this be her? She said she was very interested and sent her address, but didn't identify which Weedman group she is connected with. She lives in Rio, Illinois. Any clues? The Denise mentioned above, daughter of Bill and Janet, is of STEPHEN's line. She will be reading this, so Denise, please send the names of your parents and grandparents on your father's side, so that we can positively identify them, and tell you how they trace back to Christian Weedman

Sr. You asked if there are other mentions of your family, and there may be, if we can learn how your piece of puzzle fits into the total picture. Let's hear from you. By the way, Denise, we have a book on your total family, cousins dead and alive from their beginning in Pennsylvania, through Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, South Carolina, and all throughout the south and Midwest, and west.

I've been asking our Illinois cousins to send some family information. In Gena's book, she has as much information as she has been given, but if no one sent her your line, then it's not in the book, so please send in a few generations to me, and I'll publish it and send it on to Gena, in case she wants to put forth a revised edition of her book again.

Illinois Tidbits

Rachel E. Weedman married Henry Farmer in September of 1869 according to DeWitt Co. Marriage licenses, read by Doris Patterson, Beason, Illinois, who sent me the following data:

Kenney Weekly Register, 12 May 1876:

An early settler of DeWitt County was William Young McCord who was born in Obion County, Tennessee Oct. 29, 1816, His parents were James and Mary (Moore) McCord who came from North Carolina when Tennessee was just getting settled. The family stayed in Obion County till the fall of 1831, when James sold out and moved to Illinois. Besides his wife, he brought: John, Hannah, Mary and

William Y. Their home was in DeWitt County and in 1836 William bought some land and built a log cabin on it, and the way he describes it, it was crude, but in 1838 he married Harriet Weedman. daughter of John and Rachel Weedman, and she made that bachelor's cabin into a home, raised the family in it and they were still there in 1876, though William says that all the other neighbors have moved on.

He and the John Weedman boys which includes John, Asa, George and Amos, used to go hunting when there were plenty of deer, otter and other wild game for meat and pelts. Reprinted in Winter 1979 DeWitt Co. Gen. Society Quarterly.

Another of the sons of John and Rachel (Wilson) Weedman, who didn't figure into the above account of John's family, was Thomas Weedman. He was born in Santa Ana Township near Farmer City, IL. on January 12, 1839. He fought in the Civil War in IL Co. F. His brother, Isaiah was killed in a battle at Holly Springs, Mississippi. Thomas was taken prisoner. Later he was released, and eventually discharged. After the war he married (on Dec. 25, 1866) Mary M. Brownlee, daughter of Thomas and Sarah Buker) Brownlee. Thomas and Mary (Brownlee) Weedman had three children. One died in infancy, and the other two were Fred J., and Ted G. Weedman. Thomas became Mayor of Farmer City, IL, and held many prominent posts in that city.

I will extract more Weedman biographical material from copies taken

from the Portrait And Biographical Album of DeWitt Co., IL (Beers-1888)

I'm looking for something else to add to the Winter Newsletter, and it just occurs to me that Helen Gregg DANIEL's line and Carl Weedman. DANIEL's line, both have Cassidy/Cassiday ancestry Were Baptist Cassidy and Henrietta Cassidy/Cassiday related?? I have a feeling that they probably were. This would make Helen and Carl double cousins. Who was Henrietta's father? Baptist John had a daughter named Henrietta, but she died before William T. Weedman married his Henrietta Cassidy.

The DeWitt County History has a number of biographical sketches of various Weedman family members.

Remember, if you haven't seen your family in print in the WEEDMAN NEWSLETTER, send me names, dates and places pertinent to where they lived and died, and I'll give it some space.

John was a child of George and Charlotte Hume/Huhn Weedman, and of course George was a son of Christian Sr. Ola is of the ILLINOIS line. I am waiting to hear from John again to learn his father's name as well so that his pedigree will be complete in our records. The Vandeventer family was quite prominent in McLean and De Witt Cos. They came from Tennessee, and guite a number of families came with them. I'm just now looking into this migration, for roots of some of the allied

By looking over these names you can see who might be related to who by the address. Also some don't want their address listed. Note the misspelling of a name by the enumerator taking the "census". Notice he has one Weidman where obviously it should be Weedman. Notice how some names change around. For example, Luvina Nancy Weedman becomes Nancy L. Weedman. And is Eugene Weedman (1953) really Haskel E. Weedman? Notice that Jantus O. Weedman has died between the 1953 and 1954 directory listings. Marguerite Weedman is no doubt the same Margaret Weedman that Eleanor Deom spoke of to me in the letter I shared with you in this Newsletter.

I went to Phoenix and to Sacramento in Feb/March. While in Phoenix I had a wonderful visit with Carl and Helen Weedman of Mesa. McLean County Marriages

Asa Weedman to Delilah Hand, 20 Oct 1836 Charity Weedman to Robert H. Rutledge, 9 June 1831 Harriet Weedman to William McCord, 21 Jan. 1841

These were taken from the Illinois Genealogical Society's publication of McLean Co. Marriages 1976. I'm sure there were others, and I'll add more next Newsletter. I noted that there were several MURPHY's, BISHOP's, HAND's and RUT-LEDGES among other allied Weedman families mentioned, and I will extract more of them for the next Newsletter. I don't know for sure if the MURPHY line is the one that connects to the Weedmans or not but Christian Sr. Weedman had a daughter, Elizabeth who married a "Mr. Murphy" and since reading here and there in the various Illinois reference books dealing with the Weedman families, I do notice that many families in that area came from Pennsylvania, and Maryland, as well as Tennessee. So I have culled some clues from all this which I'll look into later. I plan to go to Salt Lake City in the fall. There you can research practically undisturbed for 14 hours, straight, counting lunch time and suppertime. I take a bit less the older I get, but still get in plenty of research in 6 days of daily attendance there in that vast library.

Since Bishop is one of our allied names for Illinois Weedmans, I'm noting the biographical sketch of JACOB BISHOP here for those of you who have this family in your line.

JACOB BISHOP

He was born in Frederick County, MD and while in McLean County, IL he was a stock-raiser and farmer. From Maryland, the family moved to Fayette Co., PA and then in 1812, they moved on to Licking County, Ohio near the Perry County line. There he met Mary Ann Weedman,

daughter of George and Charlotte (Hume/Huhn) Weedman. Her brother and Jacob became good friends. Mary Ann married Jacob on May 10. 1820. In 1829 they moved to Randolph Grove in McLean County. There were several families who moved at that time from the Ohio area to McLean County. There the close association with the Weedman family continued.

Jacob and Mary Ann (Weedman)
Bishop had thirteen children: Sarah
Ann, George B., Hannah, Charity, Jacob C., Charlotte, John S., Mary E.,
Harriet, William F., Elizabeth, Joseph
A, A. M., all living within twenty five
miles of the old Bishop Homestead in
Randolph Grove. Mary Ann died 24
Jan. 1873. They had sixty-eight
grandchildren.

WILLIAM L. SWINEY

William was born in Menard County, IL on Sept. 3, 1851. His parents., William C. and Elizabeth (Eldridge). Swiney were early settlers in that area, coming with their family from Kentucky. William Sr brought his family to DeWitt County, IL in 1870. He had owned land in Menard Co., and in DeWitt County. William L. met and wed Sarah C. Weedman after the move to DeWitt county, The marriage took place June 21, 1875. Sarah was a daughter of George Weedman, son of George Weedman Sr. George Jr. was born in Perry County, OH in 1824, his parents and grandparents moving out that way from Fayette County, PA. No mention made of the children of William L. and Sarah Weedman Swiney.

JOHN WEEDMAN

This is the John Weedman, son of John Jesse and Rachel (Wilson) Weedman. He is the John Weedman who became a wealthy citizen, well known in both McLean and DeWitt Cos. in Illinois. He was very active in many endeavors over the years. Occupation: stock dealer and banker. He was born in Perry County, Ohio Feb 5, 1828. He lived in DeWitt county many years and them moved to Iowa. His father, John Weedman was born in Fayette County, Pa in 1797, son of George Weedman and Charlotte Hume /Huhn Weedman. This John was married to Rachel Wilson who was born in Marvland. He died March 6, 1867 in Webster City, IA where he had moved after the death of his beloved wife, which occurred in DeWitt County in 1853. John Jr. (the banker) lived at home until 1850, when he and three brothers and several others went to California to find gold. They didn't find any to speak of, and so moved back to De Witt County. He married Mary A. McDonald March 31, 1853. She was born in Madison County, Ohio. Sep. 22, 1834.

John and Mary had six children, four living to adulthood. These four were: Harriet J., born Dec. 21, 1857, Cassius M, August 12, 1860; Rachel, Mar. 4, 1862; and John S. born. Dec 15, 1865.

Mary McDonald Weedman wife of John, and mother of the above children was the daughter of Thomas McDonald born in Tennessee in 1802. He married in Ohio Rebecca Erwin.

GEORGE and son, JOHN JESSE WEEDMAN

George Weedman, son of Christian and Elizabeth (Craddock)? Weedman was born in Pennsylvania and moved with his family to Perry Co. Ohio "some years after his marriage". He was first married in Favette County. PA to Charlotte Hume/Huhn. The record of the baptisms of some of their children in St Jacob's Lutheran church spells the name Huhn. And indeed, the Huhn records of that church are spelled with the old country spelling.....Huhn. This biographical sketch says that George's father was born in Holland and emigrated to PA prior to the Revolutionary War. This sketch was given to the compilers of the Portrait and Biographical Album of Piatt and DeWitt Cos. Illinois published in 2888, after the deaths of Christian Sr., George's father.

The land in Fayette Co where George was born was named "NEW HOL-LAND" and perhaps the family did live in Holland from where they sailed (Rotterdam) on the "Anderson" to the New World, but originally, it is believed, until proven otherwise, that they were of German descent which isn't much different than Dutch. However, of late I've done nothing to confirm this. I have a new computer, and can get contact with people from

Holland and Germany, and I'll enquire about this matter. Suffice it to say, for now, that George was a son of Christian, Sr, and that he (George) was born in Fayette Co., PA. He and Charlotte moved to Perry Co., (taken from Fairfield Co.) Ohio. After the death of Charlotte, which occurred after their children were grown, he married Phoebe Halsey in Illinois.

John Jesse Weedman was the second child of George and Charlotte, born in Pennsylvania and baptized in the Lutheran church mentioned above. John Jesse grew up in Ohio and in 1830 moved first to Heyworth, in McLean County. Life wasn't easy for them, and soon they moved on to the Farmer City area of Illinois. He married Rachel Wilson in Ohio. Some years after the demise of Rachel, in Illinois, John married Mrs. Minerva Gamble, nee Yazell, and moved to Webster City, Iowa, where he died in 1866 aged 74 years.

They went first to the settled safer places, and Bardstown was ready for them in 1784. When Nelson County was first formed it took in a larger territory than it does today. Counties which were derived from Nelson are: Washington, Marion, Taylor, and parts of each of: Edmonson, Hart, Green, Butler and McLean, Ohio, Davies, Hardin, Breckinridge, Meade, Hancock, Bullitt, Spencer, Larue and Grayson. So if you had people from any of these counties, you will want to check out the libraries and historical societies in this area, as well as visit the site of Stephen Foster's home, and maybe have a look at Fort Knox. They don't give out samples, however, so bring

your own money. We are bound to have an enjoyable time, and we can count on Rough River Dam State Park for our 1998 reunion. We thank Jim and Alma for getting these facilities for us, and you'll hear more about them as time goes by. If you have questions that need fast answers, please feel free to write to:

small jewelry and silver manufacturing company and his specialty was making silver crest spoons. He was killed during an air raid of WW II. The place is still going, and his son-inlaw and daughter are running the place now. They are: Alois and Grete Rischreiter. The first Widman in this family was named Israel Widman, and he was one of the founders of Baden, Germany. Bettie didn't say what town Alois and Grete live in now and where the factory still stands. Bettie, could you add this information? Maybe it is Baden?

Family Crest Information

Speaking of Crests and Coats of Arms, I received a letter from G. K. Beaulah & Co., 23 Park Street, Hull, HU2 8RU, England, makers of heraldic products and crests of all kinds. They have over 100,000 crests available for 100 Clan names. and they hold records of family arms for the majority of European names. You may want to write them for their brochure, and details. Price quote was from \$28.00 to \$37.00. The brochure they sent showed very good work, and the price seems to be good, too. Since there may be several different crests or coat of arms for one name, they would like to have a Xerox copy of the one you prefer, should you decide to go with their offer. For instance, although the brochure can't list all of the names representative of what they have, I know from my own research that the SHAW family has 2 and possibly more, coats of arms. If you write, you may want to ask if it is possible to design your own crest

and have it made up. You know, it is possible to place a lovely crest of your own as the beginning of your own family dynasty. I know a family named Scott who designed one and it hangs proudly on their wall. Mr. Scott is a fisherman, and his wife a seamstress, and so the crest contains four sections; one with a fish in a net, another with a needle & thread laying atop a piece of cloth, and the third is a dog and the forth has 5 hearts with the initial of each of their children's names in a heart. It will be passed on to the oldest child in each generation.

I can talk to Germans on my Computer, and I received a reply (in English) from Rainer Koetting saying that Widman is fairly common. It exists in Odenwald, a little mountain area between Darmstadt and Heidelberg. It is not as common as Meyer, Meuller, Schmidt or Schmitt. Herr Koetting says. I will ask about the name Weedman on the European Bulletin Board, too.

Thanks, Bettie for bringing up this topic.

A Note from Cathy Stone

Cathy Stone has sent us her pedigree chart down from Elizabeth Weedman who was a daughter of Christian Weedman Jr. and Mary Marshel. Elizabeth married Hosea Stone. Their son, John M. Stone born 1822 in Grayson Co., KY married Mahetable "Hettie" Weedman, daughter of John and Mary "Polly" Stone Weedman. They were double cousins. We don't know where they were buried nor where they died. If the Stones had a burial ground, we might find them buried there. Gena Lee, what might you know about this? Is there a STONE cemetery in or around Caneyville? Their son, Lafayette Stone born 5 June 1858 married 13 Jan 1889, in Grayson Co., Palestine "Pallie" Dennison, daughter of Henry Clay Dennison and Eliza (Weedman) Dennison. Eliza was a daughter of John and Polly (Stone) Weedman.. Palestine and "Lafe" Stone are buried in the Oakwood Cemetery in Ohio Co. KY. Their son, John William Stone was born in Ohio Co., KY in 1905, and he moved his family to Evansville, IN. He married Hazel May Simpson, daughter of Silas and Nancy Mary (Simpson) Simpson. Silas' father and Nancy's father may have been some way related, but it's not apparent on Cathy's chart. John passed away 16 Nov. 1982 in Evansville. Other familiar names in Cathy's pedigree are: Carter, Barnes, Ezell, Walters and Rains. I find this chart very interesting, as the old Kentucky families are well known. I can hardly wait for next summer's reunion. Cathy writes:

Green Brother' Mill in Grayson County Kentucky

Gena Lee Theiss sent a very interesting article about the old gristmill at

Falls of Rough River, operated by the Green Brothers for 140 years before 1960. It was made an historic site in the 1970's. A picture came with the article. The Green brothers operated the old mill and adjacent wheat house and corn crib after Judge Benjamin Sabastian built it in the early 1800's. George Washington is supposed to have owned part of the land at one time where the Green family lived and built their business.

Now the heirs of the Green estate and the Kentucky Heritage Council and leaders of Breckinridge and Grayson Counties hope to obtain a federal grant to restore the area to it's original state. The Green heirs stated that they would like to see this area become a "step back in time" for the public. We must agree that we, too would like to see this happen. There's a grant that will match private funds that may be raised for the restoration. I don't know who is in charge, or how one could contact the Green heirs, but wouldn't it be interesting to learn the whole story and who were the "Green brothers"? I am reckoning that one of them was Willis Green, a citizen of Grayson Co. in 1850. He died in 1856, I believe, but need to recheck that.. I feel certain that this Willis Green or his ancestors, were somehow connected to the Weedmans. I've gone over this with you all before. IF ANYONE KNOWS ANYTHING ABOUT THE GRAYSON COUNTY GREEN FAMILIES, PLEASE LET ME HEAR FROM YOU...

Response was good from the Illinois Weedmans and we are happy to continue the biographical sketches of the early Illinois Weedman families. We want to save room for the census records (1880) sent by Joyce W. Anthony, so I'm going to include only a couple of biographies here.

Amos Weedman - Biographical Sketch

Amos Weedman was born on May 12, 1826 in Perry County, Ohio. He was a son of John and Rachel (Wilson) Weedman. While he was quite young, his family along with several other related families moved to DeWitt Co., IL. He married Mary McCord on December 16, 1847. She was born May 25, 1850 in Jackson County, TN to James W. and Julia (Moore) Mc-Cord. Her parents were: Charles and Mary (Smith) Moore of Wales and Scotland respectively. Charles was a cooper, and a Revolutionary War veteran. They were parents of Smith Y. and William Rucker Weedman. These two are listed with their families in the 1880 census, part of which follows.

probably have been born about 1740. There shouldn't be too many "Aquilla Gilbert" s in that area. I doubt if there'd be more than one.

Remember in the last Newsletter I told some about the series of pedigree charts Cathy Stone made from researching the various lines Weedman and allied. She cited sources and among them. Cathy visited local libraries in Grayson Co. KY for information on her Kentucky lines. She went to Hartford, Leitchfield, both small towns, but their libraries apparently hold a treasure trough of data.
