Possible Scam – Weedman Family Mail Solicitation

There is a possible scam that you may have received or will receive in the near future. This is a solicitation for "The Year 2001 Weedman Family Yearbook" from Morphcorp, LLC dba The Weedman Family News, Maxwell and Christina Weedman, 1181 South Parker Road, #105, Denver, CO 80231.

The offering is a book plus a free CD ROM that supposedly "contains all the Weedman records".

There is no Maxwell and Christina Weedman. The information advertised, while we haven't seen the works actually offered, are no doubt similar to that sold in the past by Halbert's of Bath, Ohio. What they offered was simply a list of Weedman addresses, phone numbers, etc. The current offering supposedly gives those buying the book "the last 2000 years of Weedman history"! Wow, don't we wish they could!! In addition they offer information about Weedman marriages giving an example of David Weedman and Rebecca Crecelous (sic) in Crawford Co., Indiana on 01/07/1841. Or, birth records, such as Wm Weedman, born 1825 in Ireland (??). And, they offer counts of Weedman families by state giving an example of Kentucky where 65 Weedman families reside.

We suggest you save yourself time and money by throwing the ad in the mail.

Eastman's Genealogical Newsletter that is available on the Internet reported this recently and we found a newspaper article from a Panama City FL newspaper which directly called the offering a scam.

The Swedish Weedman Family

Edward Weedman Family

Contributed by Anna M. Varvais 6th Generation descendent of Olaf Weedman

Edward Weedman was born March 15, 1861 and was the fourth child of Olaf and Britta (Andersdotter) Weedman, who were the first Weedman Settlers of Copley Township, Knox County, IL.

According to Weedman family records, Edward married **Anna Christine Peter-son** on 10 December 1880. Anna was the daughter of **Lars** and **Anna Peterson**, immigrants from Stockholm, Sweden. In the 1880 census, Anna, age 19, was a servant born in Sweden as were her parents.

Edward and Anna raised their eight children in Copley Township, which was later named Victoria, Knox County, IL. These children included:

Emma C., November 1886 – unknown William Walter, 1888 – 1957 Charles, 1892 – 1928 Clara Minerva, 1895-1984 Esther Christine, 1896-1973 Otto Leroy, 1898 - 1975 Lawrence Edward, 1901 – 1979 Wallace Alfred, 1903-1975

The Victoria Cemetery, located one mile northeast of Victoria, is a Weedman family historical site. The monuments of Olaf and Brita Weedman are there as well as those for Edward, Anna, and their descendents

Descendents of Edward and Anna are spread throughout the United States al-

though Victoria is still home to a few of the family.

Catherine Weedman Huhn Kefover

Youngest Daughter of Christian and Elizabeth Weedman

(This is an update on the family of Catherine Weedman Huhn Kefover. She was the youngest daughter and probably the youngest child of Christian and Elizabeth Weedman. She married in Fayette Co., Pennsylvania but after a brief marriage that produced at least four children, her husband, John Huhn, Jr. Apparently three of these children grew to adulthood. About 1805 or 1806, she married Jacob Kefover in Fayette County and they soon joined the Weedman family in Perry County, Ohio. There were two known children of this marriage. When the family moved to Ohio, apparently two Huhn children, Henry and Hannah, remained in Pennsylvania.

We have wondered why the family was split (and will probably never know) and what happened to the family after Catherine Kefover died. Her son, James Kefover, sold out soon after her death and until recently, it was unclear what happened to them.

This article addresses the second question).

The Huhn family is fairly well documented and we will not publish and further details on them at this time. Interestingly, there were two Weedman-Huhn marriages – **George Weedman** married **Charlotte Huhn** and **Catherine Weedman** married **John Huhn, Jr**. We can recall one other similar family situation with two sons of **William Weedman** of Perry Co., OH (**Green Berry Weedman** and **John Weedman**) marrying three daughters of **John Cart** (Green married Susan Cart while John married X **Cart** and then **Mariah Cart** when his first wife died).

When **Catherine Kefover** died in Perry County, Ohio in 1861, the descendents of **Hannah Huhn Hull** as well as **Henry Huhn** and his children went to court to claim their share of the estate. This is one of two lawsuits (the other relates to the death of **John Weedman**, brother of Catherine, who died 1830 in adjacent Licking County, Ohio), which gives a very clear definition of the families involved. **Hannah Hull** had moved to Indiana and apparently died prior to her mother. Henry and his children remained in Fayette Co., PA. Interestingly, the estate of **Catherine Weedman Kefover** amounted to \$763.77 and consisted entirely of personal property.

4. James² **Kefover**. Born, **circa 1817**, in Perry Co., OH. Died, circa 1872 (?), in McLean Co., IL. Occupation: Farmer.

He married Catherine Brakiover, circa 1840, in Licking Co., OH. Born, circa 1817, in Unk. Co., OH. Children:

- i. William H. H.³. Born, **circa 1841**, in Perry Co., OH. He married, first, Malinda **Graves**, **27 Mar 1866**, in McLean Co., IL. He married, second, Sarah J. **Houghman**, **25 Jan 1872**, in McLean Co., IL.
- ii. Jacob. Born, circa 1844, in Perry Co., OH.
- iii. Nancy Jane. Born, circa 1847, in Perry Co., OH.
- iv. Isabella. Born, **circa 1851**, in Perry Co., OH. She married George **Ludwick**, **20 Apr 1867**, in McLean Co., IL.

Shortly after the death of **Catherine Weedman Kefover**, James sold the homestead and seemed to have disappeared. Recently, given the ages of his sons, we checked Civil War records and found that they had moved to McLean Co., IL. This is not surprising given the fact that James' uncle, **George Weedman**, had moved there some thirty years earlier and there were a large number of relatives in that area.

It appears that William H.H. Kefover (was he named for William Henry Harrison who was President in 1841 when Kefover

was likely born?) filed for a Civil War pension based on service in both Ohio and Illinois. He served first in Company G, 31st Ohio Infantry as a Private and then in the 3rd Illinois Calvary also as a Private. He filed for a pension from Illinois 4 February 1891 and was living in Missouri at the time. We have had no contact with any descendent of **William Kefover**.

Jacob Kefover (Jr.?) also served in the Civil War and was a Private in Company D, 62nd Ohio Infantry. A pension request was filed in Illinois naming his mother, Catherine, as the beneficiary. We have determined there is a tombstone for a **Jacob Kefover** in the Glendale National Cemetery near Richmond, VA. He is buried in Section D, Grave 196 but no dates were given for his birth or death by the source found on the Internet. Jacob must have died in the Civil War but it is possible he is buried there as a veteran. We will obtain his military and pension files to ascertain which is the case.

We know nothing further of Nancy Jane Kefover or of Isabella Kefover Ludwick.

James Kefover died circa 1875/76 in McLean Co., IL according to probate records on file there.

We have searched for a number of years trying to determine what happened to this family as well as to make contact with descendents. We now know where they went but are still seeking contact.

Weedman, Weidman, Wiedman, Widman, Widmon What is our name?

Well, good question! We have welcomed three new subscribers —Myrtle Weidman Kenyon, Lillie Weidman Engle, and Myrtle's son, Neil Kenyon.. We notice that the surname is spelled Weidman and Neil says his mother states this is the way it has always been spelled!

Information from the Florida branch indicates the progenitor of this line was Carl Wiedman from Bierstadt, Germany. Ultimately the spelling of the name changed to Weedman.

We have seen the spelling Weadman used in some land records as well as military records. Makes some sense as the pronunciation is the same as Weedman and Weidman.

As I have related more than once, I had Uncles that spelled their name Weidman while my Father spelled his Weedman. If I wanted to stir the family up a bit I could ask what is the right spelling of the family name in the presence of my Dad and his brothers. I would have to leave the room at that point because a heated discussion would follow.

Who is right? Probably everyone! I notice the Florida Weedmans had first names in an Hispanic type of pronunciation indicating that names change with time and probably our ancestors ability to spell!

To the right is the signature of Christian Weedman, Sr. from his will dated 1810 in

Ty is horginuon

Fairfield Co., Ohio. At first glance it doesn't appear to be a signature at all. But, on careful scrutiny the surname appears to be Widmon. And, Christian is spelled "Christion". I suspect the name was originally Widman but Anglicized at some point. It is clear that those doing genealogical research on the family would do well to look at all variant spellings of the name rather than stick with one particular version.

We have signatures of Christian Weedman from his entry into this country, on deeds and on his will. Not surpris-

We are delighted to help all who are seeking Weedman roots. Many have been given their lines back to Christian, and most have signed up for the Newsletter. Of course there's a lot more to it than that; we who are signed up get to meet a lot of related Weedmans, some from KY, IN, OH, PA, IL...all over America. The last reunion was held at Farmer City, Illinois, and we had a wonderful time there. Now, since we have these reunions once every two years, we are already planning where the next one is going to be. We try to get the Reunions in a place where we can actually walk on ground they walked on, see what they saw and learn the history of the area.

One of Christian Weedman Sr.'s daughters was Elizabeth. We believe that she was born about 1767 in "Pennsylvania". The borders between VA, PA and MD were not officially established until 1783-4. So we cannot be sure where Elizabeth actually was born, but we're assuming Pennsylvania. She married a "Mr. Murphy" because in Christian Sr's will he names his children and calls her "Elizabeth Murphy". We have been trying ever since we discov-

ered his will, to locate this "Mr. Murphy" who was her husband. Recently we discovered a series of thick books containing abstracts of Revolutionary War soldiers' petitions for a pension. There were plenty of Murphy's but there was one who definitely stood out as a possibility of being the Murphy who married **Elizabeth Weedman**. His pension application brief reads:

JOHN MURPHY VA line, S40191, BLW # 564-100 appl. 14 Aug 1820, Fairfield County, OH, aged 70 in July 1820, with a wife Elizabeth, aged 40, "sickly" Could this be our Elizabeth? Age is not always on the button. She may have been older, or younger, but probably not younger. Notice they were living in Fairfield County, Ohio. So were Christian and several other children of Christian. I don't exactly know how to get his records, but there is surely a way. I'll be working on this.

Neil Kenyon tells the next story on paper for us to enjoy, about his grandfather, Roy Logan Weidman, son of Philip Weedman/Weidman of Crawford Co., IN. Like me, you will be touched by the sincerity and simplicity of this wonderful family's story.

Now I Know Grandpa Weidman

I never met my grandfather, **Roy Logan Weidman** - he died on Aug. 8, 1942 before I was born on Feb. 24, 1945.
Grandpa was born on June 6, 1898, the son of **Phillip Weidman** and **Lucinda Jane Clark**. He married my grandmother, **Esther Belle Deich**, on Oct. 10, 1921 and to them were born two children: My mother, **Myrtle Isabelle**, born on Aug. 8, 1922 and my aunt, **Lillie**

My mother had often shared with me about grandpa and how he had passed away not long after she had married my dad. She had related some of the details of his death but my thoughts at those times were on my mother and aunt and my grandmother and how they must have felt and the sorrow they shared because of the early death of their dad and husband. Grandpa I had not met and did not know – he was just a date – Aug. 8, 1942. There were some pictures of him – but just pictures; no life, no recognition, no knowing him. And that is how it sometimes gets with genealogy, those in our family tree whom have died before we were born, even when there are pictures and stories, often are just dates and oh how obsessed we can become with having the right date! Then, out of the blue, in the research one is doing on his family history - amongst all those dates and places, a bit of information emerges that opens the door between their life experiences and yours and you connect with that person, and you know them. And so, now I know Grandpa.

Not long ago my mother handed me a long misplaced scrapbook full of poems and other writings which had been clipped and placed there years ago by my mother when she was a teenager—some coming from my grandmothers clippings. Among those was a small poem clipped by my grandfather entitled, "MY LITTLE GIRL FELL ILL" written by Anne Campbell in 1933. A note written under it in my mothers' hand read, "Poem Daddy found the day Myrtle was operated on", and it reads as follows:

I thought that money's scarcity Was more than I could bear, And met approaching Poverty With sorrowing despair.

And then my little girl fell ill. Death lingered with closed wings, I sat beside her, spent and still. And thought of many things.

But never once of money's loss Or living's endless strife, But ever of the heavy cross I'd bear through all my life.

Then she got well! In the glad dawn I sang with grateful breath.
And now I measure woe upon The black yardstick of Death.

In 1934, when my mother was 12 years old, she became seriously ill when her appendix ruptured. Mom has told me how her father, having no car or other transportation, carried her to the hospital which was located some ways from their home in New Albany, Indiana and how he had sat there by her bed as the doctors relayed the dreadful news that there was only a one in one thousand chance that she could live, and that was only if they did surgery. A surgery that, in those days, was extremely dangerous under any condition let alone a ruptured appendix. It was during this surgery that my grandfather must have found the poem quoted above. Having read this poem and knowing the circumstances under which it was found and clipped gives me keen insight to how my grandfather felt - how he loved his family, and his faith. It opened the door and connected me with him because I shared the same type of experience when in 1983 my little girl at the age of 9 fell seriously ill with a brain tumor and the only option for her was a dangerous surgery, followed by another a year later, and yet another in 1989. Often have I sat by the same bed as did my grandfather – I heard the same words as he – "there's not much hope." And after

radiation treatments, "Only six months at the most." I experienced the same thoughts and the rearranging of priorities. I am sure that grandpa would have gladly taken my mothers place upon that bed - yes, I know grandpa now! I know the same tears, the same stress, the same long wait, and the same loving watch of his little girl.

My grandfather and I have shared another thing, and that was the last stanza of that little poem he clipped so long ago. My grandfather's little girl is 79 years old this year and his grandson's little girl is 28 years old this year. And Grandpa and I both have shared together yet another experience and that is the hand of God in our lives. So now I know Roy Logan Weidman, my grandpa, in a way I didn't know him until I read the poem that he clipped that day his daughter had surgery – the poem that someone saved and pasted in a scrapbook many years ago.

So, as we search out our family generation from generation let us not forget about the generation yet to be born – there may be one there who needs to know you, so leave them something to latch onto in the list of notes you make – leave something of you.

Willie and Verna raised their eight children in Victoria, Knox County, Illinois. Their children included:

Crawford Co., IN Cemetery Findings

James Wilson Weedman, 93

SUDLERSVILLE, Md. - James Wilson Weedman of Sudlersville Feb. 26, 2001. He was 93.

Mr. Weedman was born Feb. 2, 1908, the son of the late **Denver** and **Drusilla** (Wilson) Weedman.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his wife, Margaret Deiss Weedman, in 1984; and two brothers, Charles Norman Weedman in 1990 and George Carroll Weedman in 1969.

He is survived by two sisters-in-law, Rachel Weedman of Sudlersville and Joanne Bonser of Marietta, Ga.; and two nieces, Patricia Hovey of Kansas City, Mo. and Carol Ann Peoples of Marietta.

Both had social security cards issued in Maryland. There are two **Denver Weedmans** in our data base: **James Denver Weedman** (1870 – 1903) and **Lloyd Denver Weedman** (1898 – 1969). Happening in DuBois County, Indiana in 1872

(Neil Kenyon of New Salem, IN who has been researching his family line, which is from Jacob Weedman, has furnished the following articles to us. It would appear that the A.F. Weedman named in the article is Allen Fleming Weedman who was born 27 December 1845 to Jonathan and Sarah (Bruner) Weedman. He married Margaret Randerson in DuBois County and the family lived in Indiana until 1885. At that time, they moved to Lincoln Co., NE where Allen F. Weedman died in 1886 of smoke inhalation. Lutie Strand of Montana is a granddaughter of this couple and we talked to her before printing this in the Newsletter. She says Allen Fleming Weedman was not a teacher and feels these refer to someone else. Regardless, it is interesting to pick up some happenings in our family in 1872!).

Article from the Petersburg (IN) Press

In Dubois county, schoolteachers not only teach the "young how to shoot," but some of them undertake to teach the boys in the ways of politics. In Harbison Township, that county, a Greeley and reform teacher in schoolhouse No.10 is one of the latter sort. The day before the election after school was out, a son of L.L. Kelso hurrahed for Grant and Wilson. This did not suit the school teacher's idea of politics and so the next morning he gave the boy an unmerciful thrashing, wearing out two large switches over his back and for no other reason than that the boy dared to give audible expression to his feelings in hurrahing for Grant and Wilson. A greater outrage was never perpetrated in this country of freedom and free speech. The teacher's license ought to be revoked and he should not again be allowed to teach in the county.

Claims by Mr. Kelso

Mr. EDITOR: -- Permit me to refute some charges made by A.F. Weedman in your issue for November 22d, in regard to whipping Erasmus Kelso. The facts as I understand them are this:- That on the evening of November 4th, when the school was dismissed Ras. walked to the door and stepped out on the steps and jumped out into the yard and hurrahed for Grant and Wilson as others did at the same time, not thinking as he says of doing any harm, and the teacher after consulting with some of the most quiet parents of the district concerning the affair, thought it best to administer a light corporal punishment, so next morning the 5th, he told Ras. that he would have to whip him for hallooing the event before. - Ras. told him that some of the other boys hallooed as loud as he did, and the reply was that it did not lighten his whipping any, and then he wore out one switch on him, (Ras.) and took the second one and whipped him until he was satisfied. And my wife went over to the schoolhouse at noon of the 5th and asked the scholars if Ras. done anything else, but halloo for Grant and Wilson, and none of them said that they saw him do anything else, but Docia Hope said that Weedman said he jumped out of the door, but she did not see it herself. And now for Mr. Weedman's evidence. Lizzie Kelso says that she thought that he whipped him for hallooing, for she did not know that he done anything else, and Weedman has got in the paper that Emeline Wood said that he told her that you whipped him for running out at the door,-but Emeline Woods says that it was not Ras. that told her, but Weedman told her so - as she was not there when Ras. was whipped. I would just say as to the rest of his evidence none of them say that they saw him run from his seat, but say that you (Weedman) said so. Josephine Brittain. Did you see him run out of the room and halloo, and she says yes sir. But I think she was mistaken about seeing Ras. run from his seat, as the girls were dismissed first, and had started home, and were some distance from the school-house when the boys were dismissed, - for Fanny Nelson aged 19 years says that her and Josephine Brittain were some distance from the house when the boys came out. Andrew Nelson age 14 years, George Jacobs 19 years, John Jacobs 15 years, says that they did not see Ras. run from is seat, and they also say,

that the girls were dismissed, and had started home when they came out of the school-house. And now for those quiet parents that Weedman consulted with in regard to punishing Ras. Kelso. Mrs. Martha Wood, Adam Hope, Jacob A. Nelson, William Merritt, Jeremiah W. Jacobs all say that Weedman never consulted either of them in regard to punishing Ras., and I think that Weedman did not consult more than one or two employers of this district, and that they were personal enemies to us if they encouraged Weedman to whip my boy.

Refutation

MR. EDITOR: - Permit me in refutation of the above slanderous article to publish the facts, and I hope the Editor of the "Press," will do me and the District justice of copying this expose, and in future be a little more careful in regard to his authority, before publishing accounts in regard to affairs happening in Dubois county.

On the 4th inst., I, the teacher, of the school mentioned, thought it necessary to ask the boys to leave the schoolroom quietly after being dismissed. They all but one, departed quietly enough: This one, (Erasmus Kelso), however, wishing, as it appears, to know what would follow a failure to observe this request, ran from his seat and jumped out of the room hollowing [sic]. I talked with some of the most quiet parents of the district concerning the affair, and we concluded it best to administer a light corporal punishment. It was reluctantly administered by myself, in connection with an earnest entreaty that he would thereafter be obedient and quiet in school, and thus avoid trouble for himself and teacher. It was painful to me, as I dislike this mode of punishment. I learned the next Morning, (Tuesday the 5th,) that I was accused of punishing the boy or hallooing [sic] for Grant. On the following day I put the following questions to the pupils named, and received the answers annexed:

Elisabeth Kelso, 16 years old. - Lizzie, did you understand that I punished Ras for hurraing for Grant? Ans.- I never said you did.

Erasmus Kelso aged 14. - Ras, did you understand that I punished you yesterday morning for hollooing for Grant? Ans.- You whipped me for hallooing. Did I ever tell you not to hurrah for Grant? Ans.- I don't know as you did.

(Other quotations follow but are omitted to save space. Nick Weedman)

There could be more evidence produced, and evidence as substantial as the above; I think this is sufficient. I will only state that the Republicans of District No.10 do not fear to send their boys with me, as the attendance has increased since the occurrence, Mr. Kelso still sends six children.

A.F.Weedman, Teacher

We have received a lively communication from Mr. A.F. Weedman, teacher, in reply to the article of Mr. Kelso, about the recent whipping in his school in Harbison Township. We have given each of these gentlemen one tilt in regard to this matter, because we thought the publication in another place was calculated to do injustice - but as spanking a boy in school is a small matter now-a-days, we think we have published as much about it as would be interesting to the public.

Article Unrelated to the School Incident

CUTTING- On last Thursday Mr. Jno N. Morgan and A.F. Weedman, of this county got into a dispute ever their accounts in the drug store of Dr. Daniels, in Otwell, during which Weedman cut Morgan with a knife in the back, inflecting a wound nearly six inches long. Morgan knocked him down after being cut, breaking two of his fingers with the blow. It seems to us the weather is too warm for such occurrences now. Sunstrokes would be more in order for local items, and this kind postponed until it gets cooler.

Emily Ellen was a child of Harvey W. and Sarah A. (Hazelwood) Weedman of Meade County, KY. Harvey was a son of William and Lucy (Duggins) Weedman, son of John Weedman, son of Christian Jr. Emily Ellen was born in Meade County KY 04/09/1882 in Grayson County, and died 01/12/1960 in Jefferson County. She is buried at Cap Anderson Cemetery in Brandenburg, KY (Meade Co). The writer would like to know if Emily Ellen had siblings, and if we know the Duggins line. Then, although I mentioned it in a newsletter many years ago, we still don't have the answer as to who the Christian Weedman was, who was in the 1840 census of Bucyrus Township in Crawford County, OH. You will remember that OUR Christian Weedman Jr. of Grayson Co., KY 1830 census, didn't show up in 1840. Now it seems odd that I didn't check this out before this. Although the names of everyone in the family were not given until 1850, the ages of every male and female in the family were given in columns such as: "males between 0-10, 10-20, 20-30, 30-40, etc and same for females. We could tell by fitting the age is halfway between say, 50-60 (which would be the approximate age of Christian Sr.) ...he'd probably be at least 60. We hope to have the answer to this in the next Newsletter.

Who's Who in the Weedman Family

At the 2000 Weedman Family Gathering held in Farmer City and Weedman, IL we had our initial induction into the Weedman Family Hall of Fame.

To qualify, the person must have made a positive and distinctive contribution to society that would bring honor to the family. We will make the second round of inductions at the Weedman National Family Gathering to be held in July 2002 in Jasper, IN.

Following are short sketches of those who were inducted in 2000 with posthumous awards first and living awards next:

Mary Weedman Myers, the oldest child of Christian, Sr. and Elizabeth Weedman. Born 1 January 1762 in South Branch, Hampshire Co., VA, Mary was recognized as the first American woman to ever cross the Ohio River from Virginia to settle the Ohio country. This was discovered in an article in a book, Just Like Old Times, Book VI, 1987-1989 published in Huron Co., OH.

John Jesse Weedman, Jr. The son of John and Rachael (Wilson) Weedman, he

was a highly successful businessman, banker, farmer, and stock dealer. He founded the John Weedman National Bank in Farmer City, IL and was a wealthy man when he died in 1885 at Weedman, IL. He was recognized as probably the earliest highly successful business man in the family.

Freeman Burford Weedman. He was the son of Guy and Harriet (Weedman) Burford and was a very successful oilman and businessman in Dallas, TX. He was born in 1900 in Farmer City, IL, educated in Oklahoma, and was a resident of Dallas. He once was considered as a strong possible candidate for governor of Texas. His first wife was Carolyn Skelly who was a daughter of the founder of Skelly Oil Company. Their home in Dallas is now a famous hotel called the Mansion at Turtle Creek. Freeman died in 1967.

Catherine Bishop Weedman. The widow of Jacob Weedman who was a son of George and Charlotte (Huhn) Weedman, she raised her six children in Ashland Co., OH. From that family have come a number of medical professionals. She was recognized for being the maternal head of a family that produced a line of successful professional descendents.

Dr. James Clyde Munch. Dr. Munch was an internationally recognized pharmacologist and toxicologist. Born in 1896 in Farmer City, IL he was the youngest recorded graduate of Bloomington, IL high school and continued his education at Illinois Wesleyan University and took his Ph.D. degree from George Washington University. He wrote what has been considered the leading textbook on pharmacology. He descended from the line of Jacob and Catherine (Bishop) Weedman.

George Perry Weedman. Born in Perry County, IN to Green Berry and Susan (Cart) Weedman, George was an education pioneer in his native county and in North Vernon, Jennings Co., IN. He was born in 1861 and died in 1914. He was recognized as a pioneer educator.

Awards to living family members included the following:

Dee Brown. Married to Sally Stroud who is a Weedman descendent, Dee is a renowned author and historian. His most famous work was *Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee*, which has sold more than 5 million copies. Sally Stroud descends from the William Weedman line.

Gena Lee Theiss. Gena wrote "Christian Weedman and his Descendents, 1735 – 1986" and a second edition and update. She is a tireless researcher and has her own web site. She was recognized for her outstanding contribution in forwarding the genealogy of the Weedman family. She is from the line of Christian, Jr., John, Willis Green, Sr. from Grayson County, KY.

Marianne Montgomery. Marianne lives in Tacoma, WA and was married to the late Paul K. Montgomery. Together, they started the *Weedman Newsletter* and she has continuously edited the publication since its inception (34 years at this point!). An enthusiastic genealogist, her contributions to the family are of immeasurable value. Paul was a Weedman descendent whose line is from Christian, Jr., Daniel, etc.

Dr. Daniel Wilson Weedman. Dr. Weedman was a professor of Astronomy and Astrophysics at Penn State University and is now at NASA. He is a well-known astronomer and invented the

Hobby Eberly Telescope along with Lawrence W. Ramsey. Dr. Weedman descends from the line of Christian, Jr., John, Willis Green, Sr., John Franklin, Fonzo, and Roy Lee Weedman.
