# **Duggins Family Connections**

Some of you, who are reading this now, will remember that your ancestor, William Weedman (JOHN's line) was the husband of Lucy Duggins. Lucy's mother was Nancy. I asked Cathy Stone if she had any information or knew how to get it on the Duggins family. Cathy found this:

### Amherst Co., VA marriages (Duggins)

- David Duggins m. Lucy Stinnet, Jan. 9, 1789
- Alexander Duggins Jr. m. Sally Smith, Jan 22, 1788, David Duggins was surety, and consent of her mother, Ann Shoemaker) Smith.
- William Duggins m. Mary Goolsby, Mar. 1, 1784.

Cathy believes that possibly **David** and **Lucy Stinnet** had a son **David Jr.** who married **Nancy** (?) and they had a daughter Lucy who may be Lucy who married **William Weedman**. You'll note that the **Alexander Duggins** was Jr. This means that possibly his father was the **Alexander Duggins** who came from Ireland and eventually settled in Amherst Co., VA.

So we hope someone will jump on this information and the clues above, and find out for sure about this **Duggins** family.

Harold Riley Weedman, 81, of Cashmere, WA passed away on November 19, 2001 after a courageous battle with lung cancer. He was born December 27, 1919 at Walnut Grove, Minnesota, to Carrie Sylvester Weedman and Maudie May (Leonard) Weedman. He grew up in the Dakotas where he attended school. His mother passed away when he was seven. By the age of 14, Harold was on his own. He hitchhiked and rode the rails, finding odd jobs.

He served in Army Air Corps during WWII from February 1942 to September of 1945 with an honorable discharge. He married **Edna Goehner** on December 27, 1945. At Dryden, WA. Where they made their home. From then on it was a variety of jobs until he started he began work in construction. He joined the Ironworkers Local 86 in Seattle. He worked on construction of five dams on the Columbia River. In 1967, Harold moved his family to Edmunds, WA where he worked on high-rise buildings and bridges until his retirement in 1983.

He was a member of Eastmont Community Church where he taught Sunday school. He enjoyed golfing, and was proud of his hole-in-one which he made at Cedar Grove Golf Course in Mrays-

ville, WA. He was an avid horseshoe player and bird hunter.

## Barbara Weedman Riffle Kerns

We have written in the past about the daughters of **Christian** and **Elizabeth** 

Weedman, Sr. Research into the female lines of the family have proven to be highly enlightening.

Barbara was the second daughter of this couple, as far as we can determine, as was probably born in Fayette Co., PA. She married **Nicholas Riffle** in Fayette County and remained there until after his death in 1808. **Nicholas** is buried in the Jacob's Lutheran Church cemetery and a stone written in German marks his grave. He was a veteran of the Revolutionary War

In 1811, Barbara married Michael Kerns of Morgantown, WV (VA in those days). He was of German or Dutch origin and was one of the founders of Morgantown. He had a mill, operated a boatvard. which made boats for trips down the Monongalia and Ohio Rivers, and had substantial property in the area. Prior to the marriage, a pre-nuptial agreement was entered into by the couple and entered into the records of Monongalia Co., VA. It seems both had significant property by standards of the day and wanted to protect their holdings for their respective heirs. We have a copy of this agreement courtesy of Bob Karnes of Columbus, OH. Michael died in 1833 and Barbara died about 1837 or so. Their graves are not marked but are supposedly located in or near the Fort constructed by Michael when he settled in the Morgantown, VA area. A marker is located in the city that tells of the Fort and the fact that the couple is buried nearby.

# George & Catherine (Danner) Weedman Family

(There has been a great deal of interest by a number of descendents of this family. We hope that the various family members can exchange information and progress knowledge on the line.)

George Weedman was a son of John (Sr) and Rachael (Wilson) Weedman. He was born in 1824, married Catherine Danner in 1845 in Farmer City, IL and died in 1893. There were ten children born to the couple, four sons and six daughters. All of the daughters except one, Harriett Matilda Weedman Baker, remained in Illinois while all of the sons moved away.

Harriett Weedman married Wash Baker and the family prospered in the wheat elevator business in and near Wichita, KS. Gary Thompson of Oxnard, CA has been in contact and has done a significant amount of work on this particular family. He does not subscribe to the Newsletter but we can put others in contact with him if interested.

**Jacob F. Weedman**, a Civil War veteran, moved to Denver in the 1870s. We have no contact with any of his descen-

dents.

Squire William J. Weedman, followed Jacob to Denver where he died in 1932. One of his sons, George Nelson Weedman, moved to California where he married and had a family. We received a letter from Donna Lea (Weedman) Laymon of Orland, California a granddaughter of George N. Weedman and who now subscribes to the Newsletter.

Zadock Sinclair Weedman married Jennie Romine and moved to Sumner Co., KS. Two descendents of this couple, Sally Randby who lives in Charlotte, NC and Linda Sterling of Haysville, KS have made contact and now subscribe to the Newsletter. AND some allied lines of JACOB's line are buried in these cemeteries, also, Some of the cemeteries are: Jasper City Cemetery, Birdseve Cemetery, Mt Eden Cemetery, Wickliffe and Eckerty Cemeteries...perhaps more have been added since these came to my desk, There is a Weedman cemetery somewhere, which is now being investigated. We'll have the scoop on this one too. We know so far that it is located north of the improved state road 164 in Sec. 31, T1 S, R4W. Nick is trying to locate every cemetery in each area where our reunions take place that contains the remains of some member of our family...all branches included.

# Weedman, Widman(n), or Weidman?

Jack and Diane Hall are planning another trip to Germany in the fall. Every time I hear of someone in our family planning a trip there I get all "hopped up" to find the location of the family of Christian Weedman. Robert Widmann has been most helpful to suggest locations where Widmann's have been found

to have lived in Germany. He mentions Dagersheim, Boedlingen, Kreis, near present day Stuttgart. The name Widman was the way Christian originally spelled his name. On his deed from Fayette County, PA when he sold his land, he spelled it Widman. So we know he changed the spelling later (in Fairfield Co. Ohio) to **Weedman**, as did many German families, because, (perhaps) to make it easier for the family to settle into the American scene. Who really knows why so many changed either the spelling or the name itself? It's an interesting study in the annals of the State of Pennsylvania archives and history. Pennsylvania has preserved lists of applications for name changes there. I researched it years ago, but the name Weedman, Widman(n) Weidman and Wiedman were not included in the lists I researched. We know that it was Ohio where the change in our family took place, as the name was spelled Weedman in later records there.

Robert wrote that Dagersheim is not far from the Palatinate and the earliest Widmann that Robert has discovered is Mangolt Widmann, son of one of the Counts of Wuertemberg. Study is still going on so perhaps some reading this would like to do a little research on Germany. I know a number of Weidman and Wiedman families seemed to have emigrated from that area of Germany. I found a number of them in Missouri records... (Jackson County) who stated their homeland was "Wuertemberg."

I am flying to Evansville for the upcoming Weedman Family National Gathering and I'm traveling light. I will carefully choose what I NEED for the time I'm away. I won't bring stuff that I don't honestly need to have. I don't want to carry more than one carry-on suitcase. I can't bring my toenail clippers, or any sharp

### Jacob Willis Weedman Grave Located

Billie Lou Bruce has found reference on the Internet to the location of the grave of Jacob Willis Weedman. However, records have been located that show him buried in the Enid Cemetery, Enid, Garfield County, OK. Apparently his grave is marked with a stone which shows his military service and gives a date of death of December 15, 1911. No obituary has been located but funeral home records confirm his funeral and burial in Enid.

The location is significant because Southern Indiana was the home for several branches of the family beginning in the early 1800s.

Jacob and Frances (Fleming) Weedman moved to Crawford Co., IN in the early 1800s and ultimately moved to a

homestead near Jasper. While most of his descendets have moved to Illinois, Nebraska, Montana, and California, some remain and will be participating in the Reunion.

Daniel and Nancy (Spurrier) Weedman moved there from Grayson County, KY about 1820. Stephen and Mary (Gilbert) Weedman (brother of Daniel) lived there for a time as well. William and Rebecca (Haycraft) Weedman moved there in the 1840s. These brothers left many descendents in Perry County.

We know where the Jacob Weedman farm was and have even found reference to a Weedman cemetery near Jasper (we believe it was on the original farm) but the graves have long since disappeared.

Three different cemetery tours are planned. **Neil Kenyon** will lead one in Dubois and Crawford County. **Nick Weedman** will take participants to Perry County (there may be two Perry County tours to cover graves of the Daniel Weedman and the William Weedman families need to be covered). An optional third tour will go to cemeteries in Pike County. This will be of interest to those descendents of **Jacob Weedman** that married into the **Craig** family.

We ask participants to bring family bibles, pictures, mementos, and anything else which may be of interest and can be shared with the group.

Items will be displayed as they have been at earlier reunions and if you have a display you want to show, there will be plenty of room! We want to share family history and information with all of those in attendance.

This could be highly significant and could lead us to learn where our immigrant ancestor originated.

# Research Findings and Challenges from Southern Indiana

Taking advantage of being in the Southern Indiana area, several of those at the National Family Gathering did some genealogical research in Dubois and Pike Counties.

We were disappointed in not finding a grave site for the **Jacob** and **Mary Frances (Fleming)** Weedman but suspect these are near the site of the Sultan's Run Country Club. Equally disappointing was the lack of a will on file for either.

Early grave sites were located for **Jonathan** Weedman and his son, **Jacob Weedman**, in the Jasper City Cemetery. In addition, the will of Jonathan was located in Pike County and, contrary to earlier reports, does name all of his children.

Cemetery tours did take us to a number of burial sites for many family members some of which were previously unknown. One disappointment was our inability to locate the graves of **Jesse Hamilton Stewart and Mary (Taylor) Weedman.** They died in 1908 and 1910 respectively and were living in Birdseye, IN which is in Crawford County. We will work with Neil Kenyon to see if we can find obituaries which might lead us to their graves.

Southern Indiana is where so many family members have ancestors and the opportunity to visit old home sites was particularly nice. Having said that, no actual homes of ancestors are still standing and in many cases we can only surprise where these stood.

To those who organized this family reunion, we extend our sincere gratitude. Billie Lou Bruce and her daughters, Kathy Sharples and Audrey Chapline, were the primary organizers and they had assistance from a number of others. We say to all, many thanks for a superb job!

We hope to see all of you in 2004 in San Diego.

# Marianne Montgomery's Memo

Hi Everybody,

We hope your Christmas was a joyous occasion whether you spent it with family, friends or alone. Add to that our wishes that you all will have a happy and prosperous 2003. Thanks for the cards and well wishes we received from so many of you.

## The Search for the Origins Of Christian Weedman

We are still continuing our search for OUR Christian Weedman. His name was spelled "Widman" on the original manifest list of the ship <u>Anderson</u> on which Christian sailed in the summer of 1750, docking in Philadelphia, PA. Upon close investigation of German records, concentrated in Weurtemberg we find more than one Christian Widman (n), which indicates that the name combination was commonly used in that area. Since then we learn that in Bavaria there are families of that name, which we plan to investigate.

We intend to make a major effort in 2003 to see if we can find if Christian was on the Anderson with friends, relatives or associates. It is possible or even likely that Christian did not travel alone. We have been in contact with one researcher whose relative, **Johanes Engel Gonderman**, arrived on the Anderson in 1750. The ship is believed to have transported Palatine immigrants and it may well be that most on the ship came from

the same area. If so, this could give researchers leads to pursue geographically.

Anderson sailed from Rotterdam, stopped in Cowes, England and landed at Philadelphia August 21, 1750. There were 236 passengers including 50 Catholics. **Captain Hugh Campbell** was the ship master. To be listed on the passenger list, one had to be 16 years of age or older. Once the ship landed, they had to swear allegiance to the King of England and sign their oath. This is the first known signature of **Christian Weedman** or **Christian Widmann** as his signature appears.

We will probably put a page on our web site (*www.weedman.org*) about the Anderson and list all of the families on board. There were 236 passengers but only about 85 or so heads of families listed. Their origins and where they went when they landed could help us in our searching. We have already located a few of the passengers through Internet research and will be comparing notes with researchers on those families. Stay tuned!

The months of November and December are for many of us, the two "busiest" months of the year, and this was true this (Continued on page 26)

**Neil Kenyon** has been doing some newspaper research in Crawford County, Indiana to see if we can learn more of the Weedman (Weidman) families who lived there. Here are two articles he located.

Jesse Hamilton Stewart Weedman – "Jesse Weidman, a farmer living near Eckerty, died last Wednesday from a relapse of the measles. He was about 55 years old and leaves a family." Source: Crawford County, IN *Democrat*, February 20, 1908. Note: his date of death was 13 February 1908.

"Lucinda Jane Weidman, wife of Philip Weidman, died at their home, near Wickliffe, on New Year's Day, at the age of 53 years. She is survived by a husband and eight children. Funeral was conducted in the United Brethren Church at Wickliffe by the Rev. J.E. Rowe, where Mrs. Weidman had been an active member for 35 years." Source: English *News*, January 7, 1900.

During the Weedman National Family Gathering in Jasper, IN in July, we stated we wanted to determine the burial site for **Jesse H.S.** and **Mary E.** (**Taylor**) **Weedman**. Following the last Newsletter, we received an e-mail from **Mrs. Jesse Weedman** of Joshua Tree, California which stated:

This is Mrs. Jesse Weedman letting you know some news. After reading the Weedman Newsletter Jesse remarked that his grandparents Jesse Hamilton Stewart and Mary (Taylor) Weedman were buried at the old homestead. This old homestead is now in the borders of the Nat'l Forest. It was 40 acres handed down from grandparents to son James Monroe Weedman (Jesse's father) then to the boys, Junior and Jesse Weedman. Because of hardwood tree poachers they agreed to sell it to the Nat'l Forest. On this 40 acres, on a hill, lays the old family cemetery. Several years ago **Junior** & wife Olive June, Jesse and I and our granddaughter and daughter went there. It is over grown with knee high brush and full of copperheads. We could see nothing remaining of old homestead or cemetery. Perhaps the Nat'l Forest service may still have records of transaction.

So, we will continue to look and hopefully find the cemetery. Mary E. (Taylor) Weedman died on 20 October 1910 on the family farm near Birdseye, IN. Neil Kenyon continues to dig for clues and family connections in Southern Indiana and will no doubt locate the family cemetery.

# Jacob F. & Squire W. Weedman Denver, CO Pioneers

Jacob F. Weedman and Squire William Weedman were sons of George and Catherine (Danner) Weedman of Farmer City, IL. They left DeWitt Co., IL at an early age and, after a stint in Kansas, settled in Denver, CO. Last year, while on a visit to that City, we found where the two lived and discovered both

(Continued from page 28) were in what is now downtown Denver!

Their line was: Jacob F.<sup>5</sup>, George<sup>4</sup>, John Jesse, Sr.<sup>3</sup>, George<sup>2</sup>, and Christian, Sr.<sup>1</sup>.

**Jacob F. Weedman** served in Company I, 39<sup>th</sup> Illinois Infantry. He suffered a gunshot wound to the left side on 13 October 1864 near Richmond, VA and was discharged from Camp Lee, Virginia on 28 May 1865. Military service: enlisted 11 February 1864, discharged 28 May 1865. (Source: military records, National Archives, Washington, DC).

A "Declaration for Original Invalid Pension" was dated 20 January 1879 and was prepared in Denver, Arapahoe County, Colorado. Jacob was 32 years old at this time. He was described at the time of his enlistment as 18 years of age, five feet eight inches tall, light complexion, light hair, and hazel eyes. He was serving at Darby Town Road near Richmond on 13 October 1864 when he was wounded by receiving a gun shot wound that entered the left side near the lower rib. He was discharged as a result of the wound for "not being able to get about". Jacob resided in DeWitt Co., IL until 1 April 1872 when he moved to Denver.

A pension application was made dated July 18<sup>th</sup>, 1879 and show an application for Pension Number 265,678 which gave the following information: **Jacob F. Weedman** enrolled on 11 Feb 1864 at Bloomington, IL in Co. I, 39<sup>th</sup> Regiment of the Illinois Volunteers to serve 3 years; mustered in as a Private on 18 February 1864 at Chicago, IL. He was on the muster roll of Co. I, of that regiment for the months of January – April 1864 and was present on April 30<sup>th</sup>, 1865. Company was active before Richmond, VA 13 October 1864.

A letter dated 14 December 1898 to **Mr. Jacob F. Weedman**, c/o Central Busi-

ness College, Denver, CO asked him a number of questions. He gave his marriage to **Almeda Slick** and stated there was only one living child, **Thornton Weedman**, born 3 January 1870. The reply was dated December 26, 1898.

On June 12, 1901 Almeda Weedman, aged 55 years, filed for a widow's pension based on the service of Jacob F. Weedman. It states he died 16 May 1901 and that he and Almeda Slick had married on 24 January 1867 in Farmer City, IL by **George B. Wolfe**. There were no children under the age of 16. Jacob had filed and received a pension (pension number 170,211). Almeda was living at the corner of Jewell and Benton Streets in Denver. Thornton Weedman and Mrs. W. W. Lawrence witnessed the application. (It may have been that Thornton Weedman was associated with the Central Business College in Denver).

On 19 June 1901, S. W. Weedman (Squire William presumably), aged 53 years, a Denver resident residing at 1737 Champa Street, Denver and Barbara L. Burford, aged 52, residing at 715 Seventeenth Street, Denver gave a General Affidavit. In it they stated they knew of his service, knew Almeda Weedman, that there was no prior marriage by either, that Almeda had no stocks, bonds or other investments and was without any means of support, etc. (Barbara L. Burford was Barbara Lucinda Weedman, daughter of Asa Weedman, and wife of Cary Seth Burford).

On October 5, 1901, **T.S. Woodard** and **Maud Weedman** filed a General Affidavit stating they were personally acquainted with the claimant (**Almeda Weedman**). **Maud Weedman** was 27 years old and lived at the corner of Jewell and Benton Streets in Denver. It

stated **Jacob Weedman** died 16 May 1901.

According to a list of Civil War graves in Colorado found on the Internet, Jacob F. **Weedman** was buried at the Riverside Cemetery, Brighton and York Streets in Denver. Contact was made with the Cemetery Sexton at (303) 399-0692 who stated no record existed of a grave for him in that cemetery. The Sexton did state there were two Weedman burials there: Leslie I. Weedman, 59 y/o, Lot 36, Ward C, born 16 April 1904, died 6 July 1963 (burial by Stevens Mortuary) and an infant child of S. & A. Weedman (Squire and Anna Chapman Weedman), Lot 28, Ward D, who died 13 July 1889, burial by Roger's Mortuary. Colorado Military Burials state Jacob F. Weedman had a date of birth of 14 August 1841.

(The census shows the name, relationship to head of the household, sex, race, age, and place of birth). From this, we can see that the family was living in Kansas from 1874 or before through 1876 and possibly later. We do not know where in Kansas the family was located but other siblings lived in Eastern Kansas and South

Central Kansas but they appear to have been there in the 1890s.

We have had contact with family of **George N. Weedman** but none of the rest of the family. We do know Thornton Weedman worked for a rail company in Denver and had one son, **Thornton W. Weedman**, born in 1899. We know nothing more of the family but will be searching to fill out this line of the family.

### Sarah Baird Stroud Brown

Sally Brown (Sarah Baird Stroud **Brown**) of Little Rock, born October 19, 1909, in Dyersburg, Tenn., died October 31, 2001, following in death her parents Melinda Emily (nee Finley) and James H. **Stroud** of Finley, Tenn., and brothers Harold J. Stroud and Raymond Stroud. Born Sarah Baird Stroud, Sally spent much of her childhood in Wilson, Ark. At school, Sally excelled in academic pursuits as well as basketball. Her talent caught the eye of a local benefactor, who sponsored her enrollment in Arkansas State Teachers College in Conway. In college, Sally's scholastic accomplishments in English and physical education prepared her well for teaching these subjects. She was a cheerleader and captain of the women's basketball team; in 1930 she was voted Homecoming Queen. At college, Sally met her future husband, Dee Brown, and after graduation she taught at Blytheville, Ark. Sally and Dee met up again in Washington, D. C., where they had both moved during the Depression to work for the U.S. government. They married in 1936. For several years Sally wrote film reviews for the Washington Post, and during WWII she was the personal secretary to General Ulysses S. Grant III in the department of civilian defense. Sally was a meticulous grammarian and an expert edi-(Continued on page 31)

tor, and she assisted several authors in the preparation of manuscripts. Sally was a voracious reader and letter-writer, and corresponded with many people, some of them celebrities such as Joan Crawford, John Ford and war correspondent Ernie Pyle. She has been honored in several book dedications. In 1974, Sally and Dee returned to Arkansas to retire.

Sally is survived by her husband Dee Brown; children, Lt. Colonel J. Mitchell Brown of Sacramento, Calif., and Linda L. Brown, artist and writer, of Charlotte, N.C.; and grandson Dr. Nicolas W. Proctor of Des Moines, Iowa.

### **Dee Alexander Brown**

Dee Alexander Brown was a member of the Weedman Family Hall of Fame into which he was inducted in 2000. His wife was a Weedman descendent through Christian Weedman, Sr. and Jr., William Weedman and his son John Weedman. The following article was published on him in the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette. On December 17, 2002, he was the subject of an editorial in that newspaper. The editorial was a great tribute to a well respected Arkansas citizen.

**Dee Brown**, an Arkansas native, commonly referred to as the "foremost historian on the American West" died early Thursday morning. He was 94 years old. He wrote 29 books, including the 1971 international bestseller *Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee*, a historical account of the doctrine of Manifest Destiny from the American Indian perspective.

Although his literary career loomed large, friends remember a shy, quiet man, with a quick wit and dry sense of humor who shunned the limelight. "He never did walk out on the stage," said Jerry Russell, a local political consultant and longtime friend of **Brown**'s. "He was

just not in anyway a showoff. He was very unpretentious. He worked at being unpretentious."

Charlie West met **Brown** shortly after the author returned to Little Rock from Illinois in 1972, where **Brown** had worked as a librarian. "It's such a loss." West said. "I don't know who will replace him as a writer." Russell and West, the retired chief executive of the National Pharmacists Association, periodically had lunch with **Brown** at Trios restaurant until a few months ago. "[The restaurant's owner] would come over and stand around and talk to him, and then we would tease him about all the women, that when you get to be in your 90s you're a magnet for babes," Russell said. "He would just kind of grin and duck his head." Brown was a hospice patient suffering from heart disease, according to the Pulaski County coroner. He died around 4 a.m.

Dee Brown was born in Bienville Parish, La., in 1908. When he was five years old, his family moved back to Arkansas, their home state. He spent his grade school and junior-high years in Ouachita County. Then the family moved to Little Rock. He graduated from what is now Little Rock Central High School. He had studied printing in high school and got a job at the Harrison Times, printing Christmas cards and selling ads. Later, he became a reporter. Brown attended Arkansas State Teachers College at Conway, which is now the University of Central Arkansas, where he graduated in 1927. **Brown** worked as librarian at the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the Beltsville Research Center in Maryland and the University of Illinois. He retired in 1972. In the years that followed, his writing career thrived. **Brown** wrote 29 books. At the time of his death, he was considered a leading historian on American Indians, westward expansion and the (Continued on page 32)

railroad. In September 2000, the Central Arkansas Library System's board of trustees voted to name its new library in southwest Little Rock after **Brown**. The library opened in March of this year on Base Line Road. Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee — by far **Brown**'s best-known work — sold more than 1 million copies in the United States. It remains essential reading for students of the Western frontier and American Indians. The book has been translated into 20 languages.

#### Eliza Weedman Gilbert

We have reported on the family of **Dr. George W.** and **Sophronia** (**Richards**) **Weedman** who practiced medicine in Nova, Ashland County, OH from the 1860s until 1890. The couple had two children who were **Dr. Charles Benton Weedman**, a physician, and his sister, **Eliza Weedman.** 

It was learned that Eliza Weedman lived

in Ashland, OH and married George Gilbert. We made contact with a relative of Eliza, Roger Simmons of Ashland. We learned that George and Eliza were married May 16, 1912 and together operated a funeral home and furniture company. The furniture company, Gilbert Furniture, still is in business today and is operated by Roger Simmons. There were no children born to this couple. We highly appreciate the fine information and pictures furnished by Roger Simmons.

From the line of Dr. George W. Weedman, there are no known living descendents. His son, Dr. Charles B. Weedman, had one daughter Elizabeth who married Ezra Kelly. They had a son, Dr. Charles Kelley who died in Harwich, MA in 1983. We have no information on the family of Dr. Kelley.
