Hello Cousins,

We are still going through the passenger list of the Anderson on which Christian Weedman, Sr. (formerly spelled Widman or Widmann) came to America in 1750. We believe, but have no proof, that he was originally from Germany. If you are a researcher, let Nick know and he will give you several names to research either in Germany or in America. These names would be of persons who came over on the **Anderson** at the same sailing that brought Christian Weedman to our shores. It isn't necessary to have a computer, because most libraries have a number of good books on German immigration, but a computer helps. Check the Weedman Family web site at http://www.weedman.org. Speaking of Germany, it's a wonderful country to visit, and if you are planning a trip to visit we'd like to hear from you when you return. **Diane** and **Jack Hall** took a trip last fall to Germany and a report on their trip is on page 4.

A Trip to Germany

Liedolsheim and Wachenheim By Diane Seitz Hall

Our trip to Germany was wonderful, the country is beautiful and everyone was so friendly. It was great visiting with Jack's family, but the high light of the trip for me was visiting the two ancestral villages of my great grandparents.

Twenty years ago when we were in Germany we found the village of my paternal great grandfather **Michael Seitz**, through naturalization records. After finding the village of Liedolsheim we were able to go to the Archives of the state. At the Archives a helpful young man searched the records for us and gave us the information he found on the family.

Through the Internet over the years I have posted information about **Michael Seitz** and his known family. I have also been able to find more records of my **Seitz** family through web pages posted about Liedolsheim on the Internet. In the spring of 2002 I received email from a distant cousin, **Rainer Oberacker**, in Liedolsheim who is researching the 19 men and their families who left Liedolsheim in 1861. **Michael Seitz** was one of these men.

About this same time, I found through a message board a letter posted that was written in 1883 between two brothers. The writer names his siblings and where they had immigrated. I recognized the name of my maternal great grandmother **Julia Rohr** and her siblings. So, I also started a correspondence through email to the cousin, **Albert Simmel** that posted the letter. **Albert** is the great

grandson of the brother that had received the letter. The brother, **Konrad Rohr**, kept all correspondence he had received from Germany. Through the letters and keepsakes that **Konrad** kept **Albert** knew the village, Wachenheim An Der Weinstrasse, where the **Rohr** family emigrated.

The two villages of these two great grandparents are only about 40 miles apart in Germany. When I wrote to **Rainer** about our up coming visit to Germany he invited **Jack** and me to his home while we were visiting Liedolsheim. **Rainer** then started making all kinds of plans for us while we were in Liedolsheim. **Rainer** also contacted the historical society of Wachenheim to help in the search of the **Rohr** family.

Jack and I arrived at the home of Rainer and his family on a Wednesday evening. On Thursday Rainer and his wife, **Iris**, drove us to the village of Wachenheim where we met a man from the historical society. The man, Rainer, Iris, Jack and I then took a walking tour of the village for three hours in the rain. We learn the history of Wachenheim from the tour and we even saw two old homes of the **Rohr** family. At the end of the tour the man gave me a stack of records of the Rohr family that he had researched for me. The records are all in the old German script. The cousin, Albert has learned how the translated the old German script to English, so he was able to translate the records for us.

On Friday morning **Rainer** and **Iris** took us to Karlshure, Germany to visit a museum to see an exhibit of the history of Baden. Liedolsheim is in Baden. Then we went back to Liedolsheim to meet the mayor of the village. We met the mayor at the courthouse after which the mayor took all of us to lunch at an old tavern

that was standing in 1861. After lunch the mayor drove **Jack** and I around the area showing us places of interest. Later we met **Rainer** and **Iris** and they took us on a walking tour of Liedolsheim. We went to the church of Liedolsheim, and met the minister. For fun we all climbed up inside the church tower.

Friday evening **Rainer** had planned a party for us at a restaurant owned by another Seitz cousin. Rainer had advertised in the local paper about our visit, inviting our **Seitz** relatives to the party. About 20 distant cousins came to the party. The mayor also came to the party, gave a short speech and presented me a book on the history of Liedolsheim. Rainer gave a presentation on the history of the emigrates that left the village in 1861. Then Jack gave a speech and told the cousins about the history of Evansville (Indiana) where Michael Seitz settled. He also told them about Michael's life after he arrived in the states.

From **Rainer's** research the emigrates left Liedolsheim, by road to Mannheim and then took a steamboat to Koln on the Rhine River. From Koln they traveled by train to Bremen. From Bremen they went to Bremerhaven to board the ship for New York, NY.

We ended our trip to my ancestral home villages on a Rhine River cruise passing the same land and castles that my great grandparents did.

Family Archives

Since the Jasper Reunion, we have been successful in adding some significant items to our Weedman family archives. These items include two currency notes issued by the John Weedman National Bank of Farmer City, IL, a copy of the Charley Family genealogy, and a cook-

book written by Frances Weedman of Farmer City, IL.

John Weedman National Bank of Farmer City, IL. This bank from about 1900 until 1929 or so issued its own currency. The bank was founded in 1885 apparently just prior to the death of John Weedman and continued to operate until the crash of 1929. Individual banks issued currency as authorized by the U.S. Treasury. One note that we purchased is a five-dollar bill issued in 1929 signed by C. O. Gillispie who was apparently either the cashier or President of the bank. The bill is in good condition. The second is a ten-dollar note somewhat larger than the first issued dated October 27, 1905. The bill is signed but the signatures are faded and not readable. This bill is in excellent shape. A history of the bank and pictures of the notes will be place on our website (www.weedman.org).

Charley Family History. This book was compiles in 1974 by Geraldine L. Deter with portions written by the late Doris Kizer, a long-time contributor to our Weedman family genealogical efforts. Doris descended from Nicholas and Elizabeth (Charley) Weedman. The book covers descendents of George Charley (1763-1833) who was the father of Elizabeth. Roy Ackerman apparently owned the book we bought through e-Bay. We would be happy to do any lookup for interested parties in the book.

Electric Cookery – Hotpoint by Frances Weedman, Manager, Home Economics Department. Frances was the daughter of Frank Leonard and Martha (Howard) Weedman of Farmer City, IL. She married Pierre Miles and there were no children from this marriage. Frances worked for Hotpoint probably in the 1920s or 1930s and wrote the cookbook, which is undated.

Camai (pronounced chu-mah-e) is an Eskimo greeting as we learned from a recent visit with our cousins who are from Alaska. On January 31, 2003, we were able to go to Sandusky, OH to meet Eleanor (Weedman) Roehl and Natalia (Weedman) Etzwiler thanks to the hospitality of Vicki (Weedman) Kimberlin of Sandusky.

The father of the two visitors was **Robert T. Weedman**, son of **Gus Clinton** and **Alice (Walters) Weedman. Robert** was stationed in Alaska at the Elmendorf Air Force Base and met **Golina Wassily**. They married, had a large family, and lived in New Stuyahok in frontier conditions. The couple divorced and there had

been little contact with the family and the other descendents of **Gus Weedman**. **Judi (Weedman) Proctor** and **Vicki Kimberlin** made contact with their cousins and invited them to come to Ohio. They were excited to meet their cousins and **Eleanor** and **Natalia** were able to visit the grave of their father and meet cousins they probably didn't know they had.

We have put pictures of the Alaska Weedmans on our web site (www. weedman.org) and even linked to a site that shows their brother, Tom Weedman, in an article about his winning a sled race in Alaska. The link appears to have expired and no longer functions.

We appreciate Vicki for her fine hospitality and for the opportunity to get to meet Eleanor and Natalia as well as Vicki's sisters and her uncle, Ron Weedman, of Sandusky.

In Search of the Christian Weedman, Sr. Roots

Just prior to the 2002 Weedman National Family Gathering in Jasper, IN some research done by Amy Weedman found a Christian Widmann in Gniebel, Germany born in 1734. This fit quite well with what we know (or think we know!) about the immigrant ancestor of many of us. As it turned out, this individual died in 1739. But it did tweak our interest in attempting to find the roots of Christian Weedman, Sr.

What we do know is this – Christian Weedman, Sr. arrived in Philadelphia aboard the ship, Anderson, on August 21, 1750. We know this because if one compares signatures on the oath of allegiance he signed with those of deeds signed in (Continued on page 7)

Fayette Co., PA and Licking Co., OH as well as his will signed in Fairfield Co., OH, they are all the same.

Christian was born about 1734-35, we think, making him about 16 years old when he arrived in Philadelphia. It is highly likely that he traveled with other family member or with friends from his hometown. People tended to travel together as they immigrated to a new country. In addition, the ship is grouped with a number of others known to have brought Palatine immigrants to this country.

We have added a page to our web site (www.weedman.org) that lists all the passengers on the Anderson. Our objective is to find the origin of as many of the passengers as possible to determine if Christian may have originated in the hometown of one or several of his fellow passengers. There were 95 male passengers on the Anderson, which is a manageable number of people to research relative to their origins. We are hopeful that others have done research on most of the passengers.

Volunteers are sought to do research at libraries and on the Internet on those fellow passengers. By searching sources such as the LDS IGI index, Internet sites such as Ancestry.com and others, we may be able to make significant progress in this search.

Let us know if you are willing to take the names of 3-5 passengers to research. We will put results on our web site so all can track progress.

If we are extremely lucky, we may be able to target a few German villages to do church and records research and find where our roots are. **Help is needed!**

Adam and Mary (Weedman) Myers

A Visit to their Graves

(On our recent trip to Northern Ohio, we were able to stop in Huron County to do some genealogical research with emphasis on Adam and Mary (Weedman) Myers. Mary was the eldest daughter of Christian and Elizabeth Weedman, Sr. as far as we know. She was born in Fort Town, Hampshire County, Virginia (now West Virginia) on 1 January 1762. She married Adam, son of Henry Myers, in Fayette County, PA. The family moved to Ohio probably with Christian Weedman, Sr. in the early 1800s and in 1814 moved to Huron County, Both died there in the 1840s).

The cemetery in which **Adam** and **Mary** (Weedman) Myers are buried is virtually on the border of Huron and Erie Counties, Ohio northeast of Monroeville in a small family plot. This is known as the **Drake Cemetery**. Copied from a book, "Huron County, Ohio Cemetery Inscriptions" is the following:

Drake Cemetery, Ridgefield Township

Drake Cemetery is located in Section 2, Township 4, Range 23 on the Chase Heyman farm, on the east side of Huber Road, ¼ mile south of Schaffer Road, along a gully. Copied in 1960 and re-copied in 1991.

Drake, Salmon, b. 1827, d. 1877 (GAR marker)

Dickey, Cynthia, wife of Salmon Drake, b. 1823, d. 1900

Drake, Ira, s/o **S. & C. Drake**, d. 18 Jan 1872 age 6y, 3m, 14d

Dickey, Thomas, d. 10 Jan 1879, age 88y, 25d (War of 1812 marker)

Dickey, Elizabeth, w/o Thomas Dickey, d. 13 Sept 1854 age 63y, 7m, 18d

Myers, Mary, w/o Adam Myers, d. 27 Dec 1848, age 86y, 11m, 26d

Myers, Adam, d. 17 Nov 1844, age 89y, 7m. 22d

Dickey, John G., s/o **T. & E. Dickey**, d. 8 Sep 1832, age 4y, 9m, 6d

References in Huron County histories noted that the marriage of **Thomas Dickey** and **Elizabeth Myers** was the first one recorded in Ridgefield Township. **Elizabeth** was a daughter of **Adam** and **Elizabeth Myers**. It further noted that veterans of three wars are buried in the Drake Cemetery (the Revolutionary War, War of 1812, and the Civil War).

Thomas Dickey and Elizabeth Myers were married in April 1819, moved to Seneca County, OH and ultimately returned to Huron County in October 1825. The couple had five children.

One further finding in Huron County was the lack of a will or even a probate file for **Adam** and/or **Mary** (**Weedman**) **Myers**. We had hoped to determine where the children of this couple were living in the 1840s. We have never had any contact with any descendent of this couple. Surely, somewhere, there is a Myers family researcher working on this line.

New London, Huron County, Ohio

(While on the trip to Northern Ohio, we took the opportunity of visiting the community of New London in Huron County. This is where **Dr. Charles Benton Weedman** practiced medicine from about 1896 until 1919 or so. He was a son of **Dr. George W. Weedman** with whom he practiced medicine in Nova, Ashland County until the death of the elder **Weedman**.

We found a gold mine at the small town library which had local newspaper articles indexed from 1873 through the 1990s! Many of the articles we found were items of a social nature but there were several containing information we did not have.

One interesting article is copied below. Dr.

Charles Benton Weedman married Lucy Iona DuBois and they had two children, Dr. Donald V. Weedman and Elizabeth who married Ezra Howes Kelley.

Double Funeral Held in New London Saturday Afternoon

One of the most unusual events that has taken place in New London for some time was the double funeral services that were held last Saturday afternoon when the remains of **Mrs. Iona Weedman** and her son-in-law, **Mr. E. H. Kelley** were placed in a double grave at Grove Street Cemetery.

Both parties had been quite seriously ill with a violent form of pneumonia. **Mr. Kelley** appear to be on the road to recovery but suddenly succumbed Wednesday night with heart failure.

Mrs. Weedman, who had been removed to a hospital passed away on Friday.

A double funeral service for them was conducted in Cleveland after which they were brought to New London for burial.

Those surviving are Mrs. Elizabeth Kelley and son Charles (wife and son of Ezra H. Kelley), and a son (of Mrs. Weedman), Dr. Don Weedman of Toledo besides a large number of other relatives. A large number of former friends and neighbors were present to show their sympathy and respect for the deceased as well as for the families who are so suddenly bereft of their loved ones.

Historical Obituary

Sophrona Richards Weedman

Death once more reigns in our midst and we mourn the loss of a highly valued citizen, **Mrs. Sophrona Weedman**, whose severe illness from typho-malarial fever. Her passing occurred Nov. 2, 1896 at 12:40 a.m. Pastor Rev. J. D, Lea, conducted funeral services and her burial

took place locally. **Sophrona** was born in Orange Township, Ashland County June 6, 1836. 2002/3 Social Security Death Register Weedman Deaths

Recent Weedman deaths appearing in the Social Security Death Index are:

Ruby J. Weedman, born 12 Aug. 1915, died 11 Dec. 2002, in Nebraska. It appears that she was the second wife of **Wilbur Wesley Weedman** who was a son of **Grover Cleveland Weedman**.

Frank Allen Weedman, born 13 Oct 1923; died 22 Nov. 2002, (brother of the late Lutie Strand who was a long time subscriber and supporter) and son of Henry Stanley and Helen (Fisby) Weedman. He died in Helena, MT.

Margaret M. Weedman, born 17 Feb. 1927, died 22 Jan. 2003, in Toney, Madison County, Alabama. Apparently she was the widow of Haskel Eugene Weedman who was a son of Jantus and Nancy () Weedman. (Marguerite Richardt or Dr. William Weedman can confirm this information for us).

The above named Weedmans (or spouses) were all members of the JACOB Weedman line.

Wesley R. Weedman, Farmer City, IL born Sept 7, 1980 died 8 Feb. 2003 (one of the triplet sons of James Amos Weedman). GEORGE Weedman line. Wesley was returning home from work and apparently fell asleep while driving. An obituary is expected from Joyce Newman and when received, we will print an extract.

Fayette County, Pennsylvania Tax Lists

(One of the most useful early genealogical tools in many states is a property tax list. Kentucky and Ohio have many that have been published but Pennsylvania also has some early lists. When in Fayette County, Pennsylvania we had the opportunity of looking at early lists. Christian Weedman, Sr. was in this County from about 1765 until 1799. Fayette was formed in 1783 from Westmoreland County and it may be helpful to look at lists in that County just to see what appears. If you want to see variant spellings for the Weedman surname, read on!).

1785 Viedman, Christian 1785 Vidman, Christian (this could be Christian, Jr.) 1786 Viedman, Christian Weedman, Christian 1788 Weedman, Christopher 1789 1790 Weedman, John 1792 Weedman, Christian 1795 Weidman, Christopher 1796 Weedman, Christian 1797 Weedman, George 1799 Weedman, Christian Weedman, Christopher Weedman, George Weedman, Jacob (removed) 1801 Weedman, Christian, George and Jacob are noted as gone!

All were listed in German Township, Fayette County. The original tax list also shows the number of horses and cattle owned by the resident (Christian had 3 horses and 2 cattle in 1785) but this was not recorded during the visit. It is unclear if the missing years do not have records

or if these were simply not filmed. **George Weedman** first appears in 1797 (he was born in 1775 so this is the first full year after his 21st birthday although it is unclear if one had to be 21 to be taxed for property or merely own property). Note the removal of **Jacob Weedman** prior to 1799 - he had left for Bullit County, Kentucky! Also, note the many spellings of both the surname and the given name! Also found in the tax lists were **Joseph Murphy** in 1788 and 1789 and a **James Murphy** in 1797. One of the daughters of Christian and Elizabeth Weedman was Elizabeth, born circa 1767, who married a Murphy. She is named in the Christian Weedman, **Sr.** will but we have never been able to determine whom she married. Perhaps the tax lists provide a clue.

Simon Overturf

Christian Weedman, Sr. sold his land in 1799 and left Fayette County, PA winding up ultimately in Perry County, OH. On March 13, 1799, he executed two deeds in which he sold 202 acres of New Holland (the name of his homestead) to Ephraim Walters for £1,012 and 10shillings. It is known that Walters was in Hampshire County, VA prior to Fayette County, PA and that he was likely the leader of the migration to Fayette County. The deed was recorded on 22 August 1799.

The balance of the land, some 99 ¾ acres was sold to **Simon Overturf** with the deed being recorded 6 December 1799. When in Fayette County, we learned something of Overturf that is of potential value. He was born in 1772/73 to **Johannes** and **Elizabeth (Remlp) Overturf.** He married **Mary DeBolt** in Fayette County and they lived there until 1809 when they moved to Licking County, OH. A **John W.** and **Zetta C. DeBolt**

own 91.8 acres of land today on what was the original homestead of Christian Weedman, Sr.! It is unclear if it has been in the DeBolt family since 1799 but it would appear that it has. Ephraim Walters also married a Mary DeBolt who was presumably a cousin to the wife of Simon Overturf. Simon Overturf died 24 March 1820 in Licking County, OH and is buried in the Old Eden Cemetery north of Kelbourne, OH. Mary (DeBolt) Overturf was born 2 February 1778 in German Township, Fayette County, PA and died 29 July 1849 in Brown Township, Delaware County, OH.

The connection of the Weedman, Walters, DeBolt and Overturf families goes back a long way. Perhaps we will never know but one wonders if the location of **Christian Weedman** in Perry and Licking Counties, OH influenced **Simon Overturf** to relocate there.

Ship Anderson Project

We are trying to determine the nativity of **Christian Weedman, Senior**. We *think* he was born in Germany in 1734 or 1735. We *know* he immigrated to the U.S. arriving on the ship, Anderson, in August 1750. Because he was only a teenager and there were no other apparent family members accompanying him, there is a strong likelihood that he arrived with citizens from his place of birth or even relatives with a different surname.

We undertook a project to see if we could find where as many of his fellow passengers originated as possible and asked for volunteers to take several of those passengers to see if we could determine where they lived prior to the journey. Only a few have volunteered.... more are needed, so if you are willing to help, send a note to Nick Weedman

(nick@weedman.org) and advise which of the passengers you are willing to tackle. The full list of passengers is on our web site at www.weedman.org.

We think this may be the only way we have a chance of finding our ancestor's place of origin.

Will you be willing to do just a little genealogical research on those passengers? Use of existing resources on the Internet is probably all that is needed. The Family History Center of the LDS Church, Ancestry.com, RootsWeb are all sources that can be used on this.

A Search for our Ancestral Burial Grounds


The following is an attempt to document what is believed to be the possible location of the burial site for the earliest of some of our ancestors. News is not good but it is an attempt to document findings so far.

We only know the burial locations for three of the children of Christian Weedman: **George Weedman, Catherine Weedman Kefover,** and **Mary Weedman Myers.** The approximate location for the grave of Barbara Weedman Riffle Kerns is known (in downtown Morgantown, WV!).

Where is the Burial Place for Christian Weedman, Senior?

Christian and Elizabeth Weedman lived in Fayette County, PA from 1765 through 1799. They sold their homestead, New Holland (see related article on page) and ultimately ended up in Perry County, Ohio. They lived in what then was Fairfield County and that is where the will of Christian Weedman, Sr. is found. They also had land in Licking County, Ohio which was sold shortly before the death of Christian. Elizabeth died after 1820.

Other family members residing in the same area were sons, George, John, as well as daughters Sarah Walters and Catherine Kefover.

Although the family only lived in this area from just after 1800 until 1830, there were a number of family members who died during this time. The question is: where were these family members buried?

Andrew and Sarah (Weedman) Walters sold their property (which was part of the Weedman homestead) in 1806 and moved to Perry County, Ohio. Andrew got a land warrant for a quarter section of land in what is now Hopewell Township (legal description was the NW 1/4, Section 1, Range 16, Township 17). Between the time the family arrived and the death of Christian, Sr. in 1811, Sarah had died. She was the first known family member to die in either Pennsylvania or Ohio. Some of the husbands had died such as Nicholas Riffle, husband of Barbara, and John Huhn, Jr., husband of Catherine Weedman both died in Fayette County.

Christian died in 1811 and Elizabeth died after 1820 and probably before 1830.

In the 1800-1820 time frame, there were no cemeteries known to have been organized in the area. The earliest known one is that of the Good Hope Lutheran Church in Hopewell Township. But, it began after this time frame.

In 1830, John Weedman who was a son of Christian and Elizabeth died (a lawsuit over his estate has helped to confirm his siblings and some of their heirs). At a similar time, Jacob, son of George and Charlotte (Huhn) Weedman died probably in this area.

So, where are they all buried?

The most likely place appears to be on the homestead of Andrew Walters. Because his wife was the first of the family to die, it may well be that she was buried on the family farm. Then when Christian died not long after, if he was indeed buried in that family burial plot, others like his wife and son may have been buried there as well.

A second possibility would be on the land owned by George Weedman as shown on the preceding map. This is less likely a location simply due to the earlier deaths than that of George's son, Jacob Weedman.

A third possibility is in an existing cemetery such as the one in Brownsville, OH which is just north of the land owned by the Walters.

A son of Jacob and Catherine Weedman Kefover, Levi, born in 1806 and died in 1832 is buried in the Good Hope Lutheran Church Cemetery.

Now the bad news! The land first owned by the Walters has been turned into a hazardous waste dump and any hope of finding anything there is gone. It may be possible to examine the land first owned by George Weedman but all known cemeteries in Perry County have been catalogued. It is worth a try to see if we can find anything like a family burial plot in these areas but chances of success are minimal.

Daniel Weedman Will

(Daniel Weedman was born in 1801 to Christian, Jr. and Mary (Marshall) Weedman in Grayson Co., KY. He moved to Perry County, IN where he died in 1854. He was buried in the Lasher Cemetery just North of Bristow, IN. This cemetery has a large number of Weedman family members buried there.)

Last will and Testament of **DANIEL** WEEDMAN, of Perry County, IN, deceased. Son John Weedman to have one voke of oxen; one sow with pigs, four sheep and one feather bed and bedding. I also direct that my son, Felix Weedman, if he remains with me or my wife until he be twenty-one years of age, shall have forty acres of land or sixty-five dollars in money, one horse or fifty dollars in money, one sow and pigs, four sheep, one cow and one feather bed, and bedding, I also direct that my two sons, Jacob Willis and Elisha Weedman shall have of the first money that may be collected out of my estate after my debts and funeral expenses are paid, the sum of one hundred fifty dollars, to be put to interest by my executor until they become of age; to be equally divided between them. I also direct that my four daughters, Melinda, Nancy Jane, Mary Amanda, and **Delana Weedman** shall each (as they become of age or marry) one cow, one feather bed and bedding, one sow and pigs, four head of sheep, and five dollars in money. I do direct that the balance of my estate remaining, shall be and remain in the possession of my wife, Nancy Weedman, during her natural life if she should keep house so long, but in the event of her death, or breaking up housekeeping, I direct that my four daughters before mentioned and my daughter, Martha Jackson, shall have each, twenty five dollars in money. I also further direct that should my two sons, Jacob Willis and Elisha Weedman pass the age of seventeen years, that they be bound by my executor, to some good trade. I further direct that if my wife should break up housekeeping before her death that she shall remain in full possession of her dower, and that the remainder of the property shall be divided between my five sons and my five daughters. In the event of the death of my wife,

the property then in her possession to be divided among my children above named and share alike. I hereby ordain my worthy friend, **John McKim**, executor of this, my last will and testament. On this 10th day of March, 1854. Witnesses: **John Aders** and **James Lanman**.

The will was filed on the 21 day of November 1855 and was probated on 21 Nov. 1871.

Not all of Daniel's children inherited. He specifically names those who he has chosen to acknowledge in his will. Willis, his first son died before his last son was born (or so it seems) for his last son was named Jacob Willis Weedman. George Weedman, his second son, was not named. Perhaps George had already received his portion either as a gift or an unpaid loan..

Elizabeth Jackson Will

(Nancy Weedman, named in the Elizabeth Jackson will, was married to John Weedman, a son of Daniel and Nancy (Spurrier) Weedman. She was born in Perry County in 1837 and died in 1878. John was born in 1831 and died in 1896. They are buried in the Lasher Cemetery.)

I'm going to abstract the will of **Elizabeth Jackson**, made on the 24th of May 1871 and executed on Nov. 21 1871. **Neil Kenyon** found a codicil (apparently) to this will, for he said something about "to her daughter, **Nancy Weedman**". Perhaps she

(**Nancy**) had been left out of a previous will.

Elizabeth Jackson made her will simply dividing equally her estate among her living children: Mary Ann Cassidy, Nancy Weedman, and Elizabeth Hicks (daughters) and sons Levi Jackson, Samuel Jackson, and James Jackson.

George Weedman Will

(George Weedman was a son of Daniel and Nancy (Spurrier) Weedman, born in 1823 and died in 1897. He married Margaret Baysinger. George was buried in the Lasher Cemetery near Bristow, IN).

The Last Will and Testament of **GEORGE WEEDMAN** (Abstracted for brevity). I, George Weedman make the following declarations: I give unto my son, William T. Weedman, all of my real estate south of the road running from the **John Weedman** farm. Also 40 acres northwest quarter of Section thirty-four (34), to be his while he should live, and to go to his heirs after his death. I give to my son, Samuel L. Weedman, all of my real estate north of the road running from the farm of John Weedman, to the north half of the northwest corner of Section thirty four (34), township four (4) south of Range three west to be his while he should live and at death, go to his heirs, and that my sister, Mary, shall have two rooms of the house and said land as long as she wants to keep them.

To **John D. Weedman** and his heirs I have given out of my estate the sum of twelve hundred and forty nine dollars and 97 cents (\$1249.97). I hold his receipt for same. It shall be used in the settlement of my estate.

To my daughter, **Nancy S. Huff**, and her heirs, I give as follows: Three Hundred Dollars and to her heirs, equal shares of the remainder of her share to go to her children. I also hold her receipt for one hundred and twenty-one dollars to be used in settling her share.

I give to my son, **Andrew E. Weedman**, the sum of five hundred dollars and one bed and plenty of bed clothes, and bedstead for his use. Also if need be, as many more as would make up his share.

Equal with the other children. If not needed, to go to my children in equal parts at his death, and I name **William T. Weedman** as my guardian.

To my sister, Mary A. Weedman, I give three hundred dollars in cash and the kitchen furniture and four chairs and one cow and one years provision, and if she takes care of my son, Andrew E., she shall have fifty dollars per year for same; to be paid out of his estate. I hold the receipt of William T. Weedman for \$1002.80 which must be settled in my estate, and Samuel L. Weedman is the Executor of this my last Will and Testament. Will made and attested on 8 January 1897 and filed on 28 April 1897.

Witnesses: William H. Lanman Samuel N. Hilt

Another Christian Weedman in Ohio?

In the last Newsletter (SUMMER) we were wondering where **Christian Weedman Sr.** was buried. He died in 1811. I looked at my Ohio sources here at home, and I see that there was a **Christian Weedman** who was in the 1840 census of Crawford County, OHIO.

We know this wasn't Christian, Sr., but could he have been Christian Jr. or another Christian Weedman? Name spelled WEEDMAN, just like Christian Jr. spelled it. It seems to me I looked into this before and couldn't find him, but perhaps if more of us look, we'll see what I may have overlooked. This **Christian Weedman** lived in Bucyrus Twp, and is located on page 5 of the Crawford Co.. OH census.

We have pages for the Florida and the Swedish branches of the Weedman family and have subscribers to the Newsletter that descend from those branches.

We have been tempted but resisted to put lineage information on the site. This could be done and we could list descendents for each major line of the family for say 4-5 generations. Any thoughts on whether we should do this and omit information on living descendents would be appreciated.

New Census Availability Facilitates Research

The availability of the Federal census records, many of which are indexed, has greatly facilitated genealogical research. Formerly available at some libraries or through rental arrangements, all records are now on the Internet at www.ancestry. com. This has permitted some research

which would probably not have been pursued under the old arrangements. We will report on two "finds" which may be of interest to some subscribers. These will focus on families that had second marriages.

James Horton Weedman

The 1910 Nevada census showed a **James Weedman** living there and working as a gold miner. It was unclear who the individual was on the surface but when the actual census record was consulted, it was found that **James Weedman** was a single male, aged 48 who was born in Indiana as was his parents. He was living in the Manhattan District of Nye County, NV. Comparing this information to our data base on the Weedman family, we find the only person fitting the information found in the census was **James Horton Weedman**.

James Horton Weedman was a son of Jacob, Jr. and Nancy (Stubblefield) Weedman of Pike County, IN. James is found in the 1880 Pike County census as a 20 year old who was attending school. It appears he never married and we are unable to find him in subsequent records until the 1910 Nevada census. Nor can we find him in subsequent census records.

If anyone knows of **James Horton Weedman**, we would appreciate the contact and information.

Phoebe Halsey Weedman And Her Children

George Weedman, the son of Christian, Sr. and Elizabeth Weedman, married Phoebe Halsey after the death of his first wife, Charlotte Huhn. The marriage occurred on May 7, 1838 in McLean Co.,

IL. There were apparently four children by this couple and we have never been able to find what happened to two of the four.

The four children were:

- **Delilah**, born 1834
- George Washington, born 1839
- **Hannah**, born 1842, and
- **William P.**, born 1847

The family appears in the 1850 McLean Co., IL census.

On June 19, 1856, **Phoebe Weedman** married **William Johnson**, a teacher who was a neighbor to George and Phoebe prior to George's death. The family subsequently moved to Peoria County, IL where they were living in 1860.

Delilah Weedman was either a child of a previous marriage of **Phoebe Halsey** or she was born out of wedlock and perhaps adopted by George. **Delilah** married **Robert Mayes** and they had a single surviving child, Arthur Mayes, Jr. (From earlier correspondence, we knew there were four children but only one that survived.)

We have been unable to determine what happened to **Hannah Weedman** but she either married, probably in Peoria County, or she died at a young age.

The 1870 Federal census for Chillicothe, Peoria County, IL shows Delilah as a 35 year old widow living with her 13 year old son. The same census for Lacon, Marshall County, IL shows a **George Weedman**, 31, farmer living with **Phebe Weedman**, 58, as well as **George W. Weedman**, 25, and **William**, age 23 who is shown as a cripple.

Delilah and **Arthur Mayes** moved to Adair County, Iowa. Phoebe died there in

1898 and Delilah died in 1912. They are both buried in the Penn Street Cemetery.

In the 1910 Federal Census, we stumbled across George W. Weedman living in St. Louis. He was shown as 71 years old, was married to Mary (maiden name unknown) with daughters Hattie M. Weedman (36 years old born in IL) and Lillie Bearsley (34 years old, born in IL). Lillie's husband, Charles E. Bearsley, is shown in the same household as well as Anna M. Weedman, a 2 year old daughter. It is unclear if she was George W. Weedman's daughter or that of Hattie M. Weedman.

In the 1920 Federal census for St. Louis, **George W. Weedman**, 80, and his wife, **Mary**, 73, are shown living in the household of **Charles** and **Lillian Beardsley**.

This is a grandson of Christian Weedman who was living in St. Louis in 1920 which is some 170 years after Christian had immigrated to this country. One has to wonder if the Beardsley family might know what George Washington Weedman might have revealed about the family origins! We have to keep in mind that George W. Weedman was born well after the death of his grandfather and barely knew his father. Still, family stories have a way of staying around.

In the Social Security Death Index, we find that the two sons of the Beardsleys died in 1975 and 1987.

The census records available today allow research to be compressed in time. Because many are indexed, researching these is greatly simplified and the Internet makes them readily available.

I found in the local library's genealogy section, a book called OLD FREDER-ICK COUNTY, VIRGINIA" It has a wonderful map enclosed in a back pocket of the book cover, and this indicates that the MARSHALL family (and the temporary home of the Christian WEED-**MAN Sr.** family lived in the time period of 1785. Christian Junior and Mary Marshall married in Mercer County, KY. Obviously they left that area along with some of the Marshall family for the Mercer County area just being settled in KY. We know that Christian Jr. and Mary moved on to Grayson County, KY and raised their family there. Some of the Marshalls stayed in Mercer County. Hampshire and Hardy counties were part of "Old Frederick" and now they are in West Virginia, so we need to search the two states for Weedman, Widman, Weidman, Wiedman etc.

Good news! Bill and Thea Weedman

are proud to announce that daughter, Arie, has passed the California State Bar and is now officially an attorney. Our congratulations to Arie!! Arie and a girl-friend of hers went to Italy this past fall. It was amazing because they covered so much territory there in the two weeks they were there. wages they would get for transporting passengers to America. We do know that Hugh Campbell was the Captain of the Anderson and he did make a list. I learned that his spelling was none too good, when I tried to find all of the passengers on Google.com. For instance, Jonas Mutchler was spelled Jonas **Murchler** on the list. Google got that straightened out for me, by asking "Did you mean Jonas Mutchler?" I found it was the same man as was on the Anderson. Many, and perhaps a majority of German immigrants were named "John" plus a middle name. They go by the middle name because there are so many Johan, Johannes, Johans etc. spellings of John, Johan, etc. was the Patron Saint of Germany maybe still is, if countries still have a patron saint.

Back to the trip Bill and Pat had last summer..... Because of the hurricane, they had to get out of Holland before they could research in Rotterdam. However, Bill is going back this summer. He will hopefully have time to go there. He and Pat next went to Stuttgart, in Germany. It's right in the heart of Rhineland, I believe. The people at the State Archives were helpful, and located the town of Gneibel where there were Widmans about the time that Christian Sr. was born. Also there were Widmans in Stuttgart Land Records of 1730-1740. There were 50 Widmans in land records. Although most of those 50 were in the 1800's....too late for ours.

There were 20 **Christian Widmans** in the Baden-Neurenberg Protestant church records. Bill was telling me this on the phone, and I hope I have it straight. The **Christian Widman** that **Amy Weedman** found may not have died after all. His name simply vanished out of the area, and may have been one of the many families and people who signed up saying they were going to Prussia, but who

secretly headed for Rotterdam, straight up the course of the Rhine River. (Editor's Note: the Christian Widman found by Amy Weedman was subsequently shown to have died and is buried in Gneibel). Many Germans did this. He was told this at the Archives (?) in Stuttgart. Some of the records found had a notation "going to Prussia". Bill learned that the National Maritime Museum in Greenwich, England may have records of interest to ships sailing for America. Ulm and Vesterstatden also had Widmans. If I've goofed on any information in Bill's trip, I'll correct it in the next Newsletter. Bill will read this, and he'll know. Bill said there were a lot of Bopp families in that area, too. Bill noted that the name Bop was one of those on the passenger list along with our Christian Widman.

You all will be happy to know that **Everett Smith**, author of Generations 1 and II and some of his family plan to attend the reunion in San Diego. Also we hope to see **Carl** Weedman also, besides many of you who we haven't met, yet, and many of you who we have, and are looking forward to meeting again.

Obituary from the Archives

Anna Letitia Weedman Daughter of Green Berry Weedman

(Neil Kenyon has been a source of excellent information on various branches of the family who lived in Southern Indiana. He recently found the following article in an old issue of the Cannelton, IN newspaper.

Anna Weedman was apparently the youngest child of Green Berry and Susan Cart Weedman. Family tradition according to Forrest Miller was that Anna and her older brother, Billy, were playing near a fire and she either fell or was pushed into the fire. Anna was born about 1873. She is likely buried in the Weedman Cemetery near Magnet, IN along with her grandparents and other relatives. Here is the brief article).

The following was found in the "Cannelton Reporter", Jan.22,1876:

"A little daughter of Green Weedman, of Rono, Ind., was burned to death on the 11th [January]. She was playing near the fire, and by some means her clothes caught, and before the flames could be extinguished she was so terribly burned as to cause her death in an hour or so."

Our thanks to Neil for his continuing efforts to provide new information on the family.

Betty is correct. Mary Weedman, the oldest known daughter of Christian and Elizabeth Weedman was born 1 January 1762 at Fort Town on the South Branch of the Potomac River in what is now Hampshire Co., WV. We don't know where Fort Town was exactly but the county history does describe old fortresses one of which must be Fort Town. The **Henry Myers** (**Movers**) mentioned was the father of Adam Myers, a Revolutionary War veteran. Adam married Mary Weedman and the family moved first to the Perry/Licking County, Ohio area then to Huron County, OH where they lived the balance of their lives. Last January, we visited the small family cemetery in which the couple is buried and took photos of the tombstones.
