greens and it includes roast and rice, and so I tried it. It was out of this world....an old Louisiana recipe from her hubby's side of the family, but ummm, is it ever delicious! Here's the recipe:

Greens, Roast and Rice Dinner

If you're using mixed greens, gather them together, wash and cut in small pieces along with celery and green onions. Put them in a slow cooker. NO WATER. Do not season the greens as the seasoning from the meat drips into them and seasons them well

Season, flour and brown a pork roast or loin, and lay it on top of greens and let it cook all night in a slow cooker. Next day.....enjoy WONDERFUL greensand meat. Cook rice and serve with the greens and meat. I used collard greens, but any greens like mustard, rape, turnip, collards....will work okay. If you don't have a slow cooker, adjust by baking, adding just a little ...1/2 cup, water in your baking pan and covering all with aluminum foil, and using 300 degree oven. Depending on your roast weight, cook, starting early in a.m. and check it after 5-6 hours.

Sometimes I just like collards as a side dish and I cook them adding bacon pieces, onions, and I use some vinegar, salt and they are delicious. We welcome any recipes that you all enjoy and we'll share them in the Newsletter.

Arizona Death Records

A recent addition found on the internet was death records for Arizona. We found an entry for W. S. Weedman and think we know who he is but cannot be certain. If anyone can identify him for certain, we would be appreciated.

W.S. Weedman born March 1, 1865 died 16 May 1943. Pima County AZ. We think this is William Simpson Weedman, the only son of Willis Weedman, who, in turn, was the youngest son of Christian Weedman, Jr. Willis moved to Cooke County, TX and after his death William moved to Arizona where he was a locomotive engineer. However, our records show that he married Inez Hooper. A separate entry for a woman who appears to be his wife gives us pause on the certainty of identification on this Weedman family member.

Lenore Evans Weedman born 27 January 1867, died 27 June 1945 in Pima County, AZ. She could be the second wife of William Simpson Weedman. Or, this could be someone totally different. Help, please!

I just checked the 1840 census for Crawford Co. Ohio. Town of Bucyrus. I found **Christian Weedman**, written in a plainly readable hand. Here's the scoop on him He was married and his family is listed as having

- 2 males between 10-15
- 1 female between 15-20

He could have been a son of either Christian Jr, George, John, or Jacob Weedman. However, I think he's most likely a son of either John or George. The others went south. We have a pretty good list of George's offspring, but not so sure of John's. We know John had a son Nicholas, and we know Nicholas's children's names, but perhaps John had more than one son. OR perhaps this **Christian Weedman** is no relation to our lines at all. There was a Weidman family in Ohio that were unrelated to us, and he might fit in there.

When did the family arrive and leave there? Who else lived there at the time? Is it possible that **Christian** and **Elizabeth Weedman** married there? These and many other questions are being pursued as we examine information available in the 1760s. We will keep you posted on progress.

- Hotel room reservations are not included in the reunion registration so you will need to contact the Kings Inn to do that.
- The **KINGS INN HOTEL** is located at 1333 Hotel Circle South, San Diego, CA 92108. The phone number is (800) 785-4647 and the website is at www.kingsinnsandiego.com
- The hotel has blocked 25 rooms for our event, and the negotiated group rate is \$99 a night (normally \$169).
- For those of you who would like to make your stay in San Diego longer than the reunion weekend, you can take advantage of the group rate from August 17th through 24th 2004.
- The cutoff date for this group rate is August 1st, 2004. If you make your reservations after this date provided there still is availability, you will be charged the market rate. Keep in mind that San Diego during August is high season for tourism so hotel rooms will be hard to come by.
- When you call to reserve your room(s), mention that you are with the Weedman Party.
- Check-in time is 4 pm and check-out time is 11:00 am.
- Parking at the hotel during ALL reunion activities is FREE!

Murphy's abbreviated application for a pension, as "sickly" and that she was 40 vears old. This would have her born in 1780, which would be a little late, but not impossible. Murphy may have deliberately picked a younger second wife especially if there were small children to raise. We don't know if there were any children of that second marriage, but Bill has sent to Washington for the pension files. This should shed some light on it. This Murphy was Rev. John Murphy and he was living in Fairfield Co. Ohio right where our Elizabeth Weedman's family lived. It really looks like Bill Denney is on the right track. Bill will share with us.

I came across a biographical sketch of **Thomas St. Clair Weedman**, of **GEORGE's** line (Illinois branch). I hadn't seen this before and I thought some of you would like to know about him. He was born January 12, 1839 in Santa Ana Township, DeWitt County, IL. He has lived in that area for his lifetime. In 1888

when the sketch was published, he was Mayor of Farmer City and had held that post for some time. He was the youngest of seven sons and three daughters born to John and Rachel (Wilson) Weedman who came to that area in 1830. He joined the Army in 1861 and was assigned to the 2nd Illinois Cavalry, Co. F, Colonel Noble commanding. In a skirmish at Holly Springs, MS, his brother, Isaiah Weedman, lost his life. Thomas was taken prisoner, and actually paroled, before being put behind prison walls. He and five others were exchanged for six Rebs, and so Thomas returned to duty and took part in the Battle of Vicksburg. His name is on the roster at Lemon Post, G.A.R. at Farmer City.

At Framer City in 1866, he was united in marriage with Miss **Mary M. Brownlee**, daughter of **Thomas** and **Sarah (Buker) Brownlee**. Three children were born to them: a baby who died in infancy, and **Ted G**. and **Fred J. Weedman**. Thomas Weedman's line was: Thomas St. Clair¹, John Jesse², George³, and Christian, Sr.⁴.

I think there are **Weedman** relatives in the vicinity of Webster City, Hamilton County, Iowa. **John Weedman**, **Sr**. son of **George Weedman**, moved out into that territory, and had family there. **John** died there and his will is on file at the Hamilton County Court House. It occurs to me I might find more details on this in Gena Lee Theiss book! Well if I seem somewhat forgetful, I can blame it on the heat85 degrees and climbing. Talk about global warming...!

If any of you are wondering about the latest revision of the *Weedman Family Genealogy*,

Violet M. Weedman, born 16 October 1912, died 1 April 2004 in Riverton, Sangamon Co., IL. She was the widow of James Henry Weedman (1915-1986). He was the son of William Thomas Bell Weedman and was from the line of John Weedman who lived in Grayson Co., KY.

World War II Enlistment Records

World War II enlistment records for over nine million Army soldiers are now available online at the National Archives and Archives and Records Administration (NARA). The records are in the <u>World War II Electronic Army Serial Number Merged File</u> available through the Access to Archival Database (AAD) section on NARA's web site (www.archives.gov/aad.

The National Archives scanned War Department microfilmed punch cards on enlistments to support the reconstruction of the military personnel records at its National Personnel Records Center. Because of the age of the microfilm, approximately 1.5 million records could not be scanned. Scanning problems also created some errors in the digital records that present unique searching challenges.

Each record may have the enlistee's serial number and name, state and county of residence, place of enlistment, date of enlistment, grade, branch, term of enlistment, place of birth, year of birth, race, education, civilian occupation, marital status, and component. Because the records are for Army enlistments during World War II, the file does not include records for Army officers, members of other services or enlistments for other time periods. However, it does contain information on more than 130,000 women who served. Here are records for 41 Weedman family members.

World War I Draft Board Records

(The following information is from the Ancestry.com site and describes the World War I Draft Records. We will list those available for the Weedman surname which contains 21 records.)

Description

In 1917 and 1918, approximately 24 million men living in the United States completed a registration card. This represented approximately 98% of men under the age of 46 covering a huge portion of the population of the U.S. at the time. Total U.S. population in 1917-1918 was about 100 million individuals. In other words, close to 25% of the total population is represented in this record set.

Information on many of the cards may include: birth date, birthplace, and in some cases their father's birthplace and nearest relative. In addition, they show occupation, color of eyes and hair, build, etc. These could be an excellent source of genealogical information.

2004 Weedman Hall of Fame Inductees

Following is a summary of the three people inducted in the 2004 Weedman Hall of Fame. The nominations have been shorted due to lack of space here. To see the full version (much better!), go to our web site (www.weedman.org) and click on Hall of Fame.

Charles Vern Weedman, Attorney

Charles Vern Weedman achieved success as a notable attorney who practiced law in Los Angeles. In the 1970s, he represented a number of Hollywood celebrities including Dean Martin and Claudine Longet, the wife of Andy Williams.

It was perhaps the defense of Claudine Longet that brought Mr. Weedman fame as an attorney. Claudine Longet was estranged from her husband, Andy Williams, and was in a ski resort in Colorado when her then boy friend met his death through a stabbing. Ms. Longet was charged with the crime and one of her defense attorneys was Charles Weedman. Ms. Longet was acquitted of the crime.

Charles Vern Weedman was born 26 November 1927 in California to Charles Shelby and Patricia Ann (Larsen) Weedman. Charles Shelby Weedman was a locomotive engineer. His lineage: Charles Vern Weedman⁶, Charles Shelby⁵, William Simpson⁴, Willis³, Christian, Jr.² and Christian Weedman, Sr.¹.

Olive Annie (Polly) Westaby Weedman, A True Survivor

It wasn't long after her birth of English parentage to **Robert Spencer Westaby**, M.D. and **Annie Otter Westaby** on April 23, 1914, in Madison, South Dakota, that her grandfather ignored her birth name of "Olive Annie" and called her "Polly Anna," a nickname she has retained all her life. He perceived that even as a toddler she saw the world through rose-colored glasses.

Her childhood was spent in Madison, with her parents, two sisters, and brother. They were all competitive individuals with highly developed talents. Their father was a busy physician/surgeon and their mother, a graduate of Northwestern University, Chicago, Illinois, had her own successful career as a dramatic reader. She presented programs at colleges, churches, and various schools, booked by the Eastern Lyceum Bureau.

Each decade of her life has held its unique challenges, heartbreaks, and victories for Polly. She was graduated from the University of Iowa with a triple major: theater, speech therapy, and psychology. After a brief but exciting career

working for Harry Reasoner, Sr., as a talent agent for Northwest Assemblies in Minneapolis, she married her college sweetheart **George David Weedman** (Jan 27, 1914-1996), the son of **Claude** and **Mary Weedman** from Faith, SD.

A few years later, the local Rapid City, SC radio station approached Polly about taking over a women's radio show. Again she was reluctant because she did not want to leave their now school-age children home without their mother. The radio station accommodated her by installing equipment allowing her to broadcast the show from home.

Her radio show broadcast from home grew into a more than full-time enterprise, especially when television finally came to Rapid City. She began writing, producing, and appearing in everything from local talent shows to children's programs. She did the research, the scenario and scripting for "Four Seasons West," a story of South Dakota's cattle industry. The production was given the National Western Heritage Award for the best western documentary

At one time she had as many as four shows simultaneously - The Polly Weedman Show; Aunt Polly's Children's Hour; Talent Review, and a once-a-week half-hour radio show. Christmas Shopping Bag, which was later developed into a road show in the West River area. Glen Yarbrough, Paul Williams, and Tom Brokaw are just a few of the now nationally known personalities who were all with her and with KOTA Radio and TV during those years. Paul Williams frequently appeared on the Iseman Talent Review, a talent show where she was writer, producer and director. The winner was awarded an all-expense paid trip to Europe and to the coronation of Queen Elizabeth. Tom Brokaw was one of her television cameramen during his college

years. Polly had the longest fully sponsored women's radio show in the nation

In 1950 the Rapid City Business and Professional Women's Club named Polly "Woman of the Year". Later she awarded the *McCalls Magazine* 10th Annual Gold Mike Award for Service to the Family. However, she felt one of her greatest achievements was her involvement with retarded children, which led to formation of the Rapid City Association for Retarded Children.

Other awards and honors followed during her years as a radio and television personality, but that all ended when she contracted Parkinson's disease in 1968. It attacked her throat, and she lost her voice. After years of readjustment, new medication, and prayer finally restored her health, she learned to adapt to life as wife and grandmother, perfecting her bridge game and catching up with the social commitments she had been forced to ignore during her working years. She and he husband, George, enjoyed retirement years together with cruises, winters in South Carolina or California, ballroom dancing, and competitive duplicate bridge.

Then at age 75, the lights went out. The diagnosis was macular degeneration. Within days, in spite of laser surgery, she was completely blind in one eye and had defective sight in the other. She could no longer read or drive a car. Eight months later a deep black velvet curtain closed out all the sunlight in her right eye. There was no pain, just darkness. At first she was angry at God for allowing this to happen, at her grandparents and parents for passing on defective genes, and at the world in general. As she said, "I really had a major pity party."

In 1996, due to their failing health, She and her husband George, moved to (Continued on page 22) Page 22 Weedman Newsletter

Naples, Florida to live with their son Richard. George died a few months later. Polly is now a residing in a retirement/assisted living home in Naples.

Polly was married to George David Weedman whose Weedman lineage was: George David Weedman⁷, Claude Henry⁶, William Martin⁵, Jeremiah⁴, Jacob³, George², and Christian Weedman, Sr.¹. His great, great grandmother was Catherine Bishop Weedman who was inducted into the Weedman Hall of Fame in 2000.

Lauren Huntington Weedman Writer & Performer

Lauren Huntington Weedman has achieved success as a writer, performer and comedienne.

She made her television debut on Comedy Central's Emmy Award-wining, **The Daily Show with Jon Stewart** in 2001 as a featured correspondent. It was at that same time that Lauren was a regular on National Public Radio's national political satire show, Rewind, and appeared in her solo show, **Homecoming**, off Broadway at the Westside Theater. The New York Times said of Lauren and Homecoming, "...like Bob Newhart in his early stand-up routines, she's particularly good at making her points – and making us feel clever. Most important, she's just plain funny, physically and verbally".

After studying, writing and performing in Amsterdam for five years, Lauren returned to the States with a bang. Her first play, **Homecoming**, began as a 15-minute performance art piece that grew into a full-length show that ultimately toured with the Seattle Repertory Theater. **Homecoming** earned Lauren the honor of being published in *Women Playwrights: The Best Plays of 2002*.

Lauren currently lives and performs in Los Angeles. She is the daughter of **Sidney Hatfield** and **Sharon Huntington Weedman** of Indianapolis. Her Weedman lineage: Sidney Hatfield Weedman⁷, Ralph⁶, George Perry⁵, Green Berry⁴, William³, Christian, Jr.² and Christian Weedman, Sr.¹.

to a furniture restorer who, while working on it, discovered initials under the paint...J J W. My grandfather was **John Willard Weedman**; I'm thinking that this trunk may have belonged to an older brother or their father. My father was also **John Willard Weedman** and he went to Galesburg (IL) High School but lived his younger days in Victoria, IL. We're not able to place this JJW in the family tree. Although my grandfather did own a grocery store in Victoria, IL,

I just thought the discovery of the initials would interest some other Weedmans. The trunk has very old hardware, but the lock had been pried off. The corners are tongue-in-groove connected; the top is domed. The bottom seems to have been replaced in the early 1900's. The restorer is excited about working on the piece. He does work for museums in the area that specialize in Civil War vintage pieces. He could tell that it was European and was originally from the earlier half of the 1800's."

Fort Weedman, Florida Update

Billie Lenchner sent the following information:

There is a Fort Weedman, but it was only a civilian fort, so there was not much history about it that she could find in Florida History material she researched. The following information is from a friend who is a Seminole re-enactor and histo-

rian who teaches at several of the local museums.

- It was a civilian refuge fort. When there was fighting the civilians would come here to protect themselves and fight against the Seminoles. There are only military there when passing through to the bigger forts.
- The fort was attacked twice. In 1839 it was considered abandoned and Indians burned it. The military rebuilt it and again in 1840 the Indians burned it again! This time it was totally destroyed. The fort would have been a log cabin type with two stories.
- There were two chiefs in the area at that time. One was Chief Coaccoochee (Wildcat) and the other was Chief Black Dirt. Wildcat was captured and sent to Fort Marion (now Costello de San Marcos) in St Augustine. Wildcat starved himself to escape through a narrow window. He was captured later and sent to Arkansas Territory. Black Dirt's fate remains unknown at this time.
- The fort would have been named after a Lieutenant or a Captain. Military records will have to be checked.

Since books dating back to those times are scarce, Billie will at a time convenient for her, go to a larger library than the one in Ocala, Florida.

Since there were Weedmans at that time living in or near St Augustine, I am inclined to believe that the fort was named for **Philip Weedman**, or one of his sons, but that's only a guess. **Philip (Philipe) Weedman** came from Germany, and settled in that area of Florida with his family. We haven't as yet determined if there is any relationship between **Christian** and **Philipe Weedman**. **Philipe** had a brother (?) named **Bernard Weedman**.

scends from the Florida Weedman line adds this to what is known about Fort Weedman. "Ft. Weedman was definitely part of the original Weedman Land Grant. I just don't know the precise spot. Much of the 150 acres granted (I think that is what was granted out of the 400 acre request.) is owned by Rayonier Timber Company. My dad's brother is on what remains in the family; it must be about 70 acres. Seems like we would have heard about people digging around there. It is not but about 8 miles from where my dad has lived for the last 56 vears. He is 83 now." Shirley also wrote in a separate note, "Don't know if I mentioned it, but I would imagine this was where the ggggrandfather was killed by Indians, around 1839. "

The pensioner shown in the list above, **Philip Weedman (Philipe)** was in this line and the Fort could have been named for him.

1840 Federal Census

AIS, (Accelerated Indexing System) a group of energetic entrepreneurs combined alphabetically all the counties in the USA censuses of 1790-1850 and put them on microfiche. These fiches are found in most LDS libraries and I looked for the 1840 census for Florida. I didn't find it, and I did find out that Florida wasn't a state till 1845. However, I did find in the 1840 fiche, the name WEED-MAN, and here are all the Weedmans in the various states who were found in the 1840 census.

Polly (Olive Anne) Weedman

Polly (Olive Anne) Westaby Weedman, 90, formerly of Rapid City, passed away October 19, 2004, in Naples, FL. Polly was born April 23, 1914 in Madison, South Dakota. Polly graduated from the University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa, with a triple major in theater, speech therapy, and psychology. After a brief career working for Harry Reasoner, Sr., as a talent agent for Northwest Assemblies in Minneapolis, Minn., she married her college sweetheart, George David Weedman, on Jan 27, 1914. They moved to Rapid City in 1944. In Rapid City she accepted private students for speech therapy and for declamatory contests. She was recruited by the owner of Radio Station KOTA to write, produce and broadcast a women's radio show. She expanded the show and her career to broadcasting five days a week for the next 25 years. Her radio show broadcast grew into a more than full-time enterprise, especially when television finally came to Rapid City. She began writing, produc-

ing, and appearing in everything from local talent shows to children's programs. She did the research, the scenario and scripting for "Four Seasons West," a story of South Dakota's cattle industry. The production was given the National Western Heritage Award for the best western documentary. At one time she had as many as four shows simultaneously - The Polly Weedman Show; Aunt Polly's Children's Hour; Talent Review, and a once-a-week half-hour radio show, Christmas Shopping Bag, which was later developed into a road show in the West River area. In 1950 Polly was named "Woman of the Year," by the Rapid City Business and Professional Women's Club. Later she was awarded the McCalls Magazine 10th Annual Gold Mike Award for Service to the Family: Her radio interview series titled "Marriage is What You Make It," focused attention on the community's need for a marriage counseling service, according the to the McCalls judges. Other awards and honors followed during her years as a radio and television personality, but that all ended when she contracted Parkinson's disease in 1968 which attacked her throat, and she lost her voice. After her health was somewhat restored by medication, she and her husband, George, enjoyed retirement years together with cruises, winters in South Carolina or California, ballroom dancing, and competitive duplicate bridge. Then at age 75 she lost her eyesight due to macular degeneration. Within days, in spite of laser surgery, she was completely blind in one eye and had defective sight in the other. The South Dakota affiliate of the National Federation of the Blind taught her white cane travel. She also learned Braille, which she found easy and fascinating. Unable to see, her typewriter was of little value so she learned to use a computer with voice output (computer and lessons provided by the state reha-

Jean Eleanor Lovejoy Carlen left her physical being in this world to join hands once again with her beloved husband Raymond Nils Carlen on Tuesday, July 20, 2004. While her later years witnessed much suffering she graciously left this world in much the same manner as she had lived her life, a queen in attendance until the end.

Born on June 29, 1920 in Chicago, Ill, Jean attended the Harris School for Girls in Chicago learning all of the finer points of etiquette and education, going on to graduate from the University of Illinois in Champaign. Jean joined and then became President of the Illinois Zeta chapter of Pi Beta Phi, continuing this fraternity connection throughout her life with the Hinsdale Alumnae Pi Phi. It was during this higher level of education that she met, then married (sans football helmet) Ray Carlen who was eventually to become President of Joseph T. Ryerson & Son Steel Company. During the war years (the one that would end all such means of negotiation, WW II) Jean honed her sales skills at Marshall Field & Co. where she was a merchandise buyer (again quite the trend groundbreaker as

this position was usually filled by a male), but it was at Ray's side through his career at Ryerson where all of her social and event planning abilities really shone.

Persevering through her own difficulties at many times Jean was a champion for all of the appropriately correct things to do. She supported the many moves a husband's career necessitated, raised two intelligent and caring children (Susan & Cynthia), and was instrumental in not only the volunteer causes of her husband but also of her children and her own. In 1960, with the assistance of but a handful of others, she organized an entire "Suzy League" softball association in Hinsdale, Illinois so that her daughters would have the opportunities that at the time were offered only to male-oriented "Little League". Truly a visionary leadership role way ahead of its politically correct time, as generations of female baseball leagues followed this historic first.

In Hinsdale she was voluntarily instrumental in the Community House, Hinsdale Community Memorial Hospital of Western Springs, and the Parent Teachers Organization; planning ice cream socials, debutante events, Easter basket selling, and other creative fundraising endeavors with her skills in theme parties legendary.

A woman of so many accomplishments through her many skills at utilizing others to the best of her, and their, abilities; she proficiently gathered many groups of friends and support about her throughout the years. However, a fact known to but a few of her friends is that Jean was the inspiration behind the invention of the "Winky Dink" tv screen.

Burial was at Arlington Memorial Cemetery in Rockford, IL on July 28, 2004.
